- *2246 TAFE FEES—Mr Richard Amery asked the Deputy Premier, Minister for Transport, Minister for Finance representing the Minister for Education and Training, Minister for Industrial Relations, Minister for the Central Coast, and Minister Assisting the Minister for Finance—
 - (1) Has the New South Wales Teachers Federation expressed concerns about the latest round of increases in TAFE fees?
 - (2) What impact has the increase in TAFE fees had on enrolments at TAFE colleges?
 - (3) With the new fee structure, how do New South Wales TAFE fees compare to fees charged in all other Australian States?

Answer-

In response to discussions with the NSW Teachers Federation, the Iemma Government introduced a fee refund as an incentive to help TAFE students complete the Higher School Certificate or its equivalent, the Tertiary Preparation Certificate. The refund, worth \$2 million a year, commenced in 2008 and is payable on completion.

As at 30 March 2008 the overall enrolment figures have increased by 2.7% in a year-to-date comparison with 2007.

Fees in other jurisdictions can vary from student to student and qualification to qualification, depending on the course duration and the choice of subjects taken. TAFE NSW fees are based on qualification level, rather than elective choice, length or delivery mode. This means that students know in advance what their fee will be

There is a great variation in the fees charged by public and private providers across Australia and each State operates under a different model. This makes direct comparisons difficult.

TAFE NSW has an extremely generous concession and exemption policy.

*2248 ABORIGINAL COMMUNITY LIAISON OFFICERS—Mr Greg Aplin asked the Minister for Police, Minister for the Illawarra—

The NSW Police Force has advised me that the three Local Area Commands are Lower Hunter, Lachlan and Tweed/Byron.

- (2) What is the response to the concerns raised?
- (3) What action will be taken to address this important issue?

Answer-

- *2250 COMMUTER SURVEY CONSULTANCY—Ms Gladys Berejiklian asked the Deputy Premier, Minister for Transport, Minister for Finance—

Who were the other tenderers for the commuter survey consultancy secured by the Boston Consulting Group which the Minister said would be at a cost of \$10 million?

Answer-

I am advised:

Boston Consulting Group was engaged in accordance with NSW Premier's Department Guidelines for the Engagement and Use of Consultants (July 2004).

- *2251 CHATSWOOD HIGH SCHOOL UPGRADE—Ms Gladys Berejiklian asked the Deputy Premier, Minister for Transport, Minister for Finance representing the Minister for Education and Training, Minister for Industrial Relations, Minister for the Central Coast, and Minister Assisting the Minister for Finance—
 - (1) What is the status of upgrades to Chatswood High School?
 - (2) Will the Minister ensure the broader community that there will not be further unnecessary delay to the much needed capital works program?

Answer-

Stage one of a project to upgrade Chatswood High School was completed at the end of 2007 at a cost of \$4.8 million.

Funding for the second stage of the upgrade was approved in the 2007/2008 Major Capital Works Program. Planning for the project is proceeding in accordance with projected milestones.

*2252 CHATSWOOD PRIMARY SCHOOL UPGRADE—Ms Gladys Berejiklian asked the Deputy Premier, Minister for Transport, Minister for Finance representing the Minister for Education and Training, Minister for Industrial Relations, Minister for the Central Coast, and Minister Assisting the Minister for Finance—

What is the status of the application by Chatswood Primary School in relation to vital capital works upgrades at the school?

Answer—

The Department of Education and Training has noted the need to carry out a major upgrade at Chatswood Primary School.

The project is being considered against competing statewide priorities for inclusion in a future Major Capital Works Program.

*2255 DR REEVES—Mr Andrew Constance asked the Minister for Health—

Why did Southern Area Health Service fail to contact the medical board in relation to Dr Reeves' credentials when he revealed to the health service that he had conditions placed upon him by the medical board?

Answer-

The Member is referred to statements provided in the Parliament in relation to this matter on 28 February 2008, Tuesday 4 March 2008 and Thursday 6 March 2008.

As stated, the matter regarding Dr Reeves' employment at the former Southern Area Health Service has been referred to the Special Commission of Inquiry established to inquire into and report upon matters concerning the delivery of acute care services in public hospitals in New South Wales.

Additionally the Health Care Complaints Commission has commenced an investigation concerning the employment of Dr Reeves by the Greater Southern Area Health Service.

*2256 "CLEANER NSW GOVERNMENT FLEET"—Mr Peter Debnam asked the Minister for Health representing the Minister for Roads, and Minister for Commerce—

- (4) Which Government agencies have not achieved the required "Greenhouse Reduction Target" "by end of 2006-07"?

- (5) Given that "Table 5" of the "Fleet Improvement Plan" records the "number of vehicles (less than 3.5 tonnes GVM by fuel type" for each Government agency, what is the total "number of vehicles (less than 3.5 tonnes GVM)" using each of the following fuel types in the StateFleet in 2006-07:

 - (b) "E10 petrol";

 - (e) "Ethanol";

Answer-

I am advised:

The Government has initiated policies aimed at changing the composition of the state's vehicle fleet to improve its overall environmental performance. Policies already implemented in support of these goals include:

- the removal of V8 powered vehicles from the NSW Motor Vehicle Contracts (where this does not impair operational requirements);
- the Cleaner Fleet Initiative: and
- · move to more fuel efficient vehicles.

These policies have encouraged the use of smaller, cleaner and less polluting vehicles within the fleet, reduced fuel, running costs and greenhouse gas emissions; and delivered savings on vehicle lease and fuel costs.

The NSW Government is continuing to promote the use of E10 in Government fleet vehicles and is in discussions with major retailers to increase uptake in the future.

*2257 PEDESTRIAN CROSSINGS AND PEDESTRIAN REFUGES—Mr Peter Debnam asked the Minister for Health representing the Minister for Roads, and Minister for Commerce—

In relation to pedestrian crossings and pedestrian refuges:

- (1) What road rules apply specifically to pedestrian crossings?
- (2) What road rules apply specifically to pedestrian refuges?
- (3) What road rules apply specifically to the combination of pedestrian crossings and pedestrian refuges?
- (4) Is the Minister aware that previous pedestrian safety surveys have found "confusion over the status of pedestrian refuges" (p. 11) (Rouse, R., 2002. "Pedestrian Safety in New South Wales Trends, Attitudes and Key Issues")?

- (6) Does the Roads and Traffic Authority have accident and injury data related to the comparison of pedestrian crossings, pedestrian refuges, and combined pedestrian crossings and refuges?
- (7) What research has the Roads and Traffic Authority conducted in relation to the safety implications of pedestrian crossings combined with pedestrian refuges and resulting motorist confusion?

The rules relating to pedestrian crossings are contained in the Australian Road Rules, which can be found online at www.rta.nsw.gov.au/rulesregulations/downloads/pts1-21.pdf

The RTA is currently conducting a study of pedestrian and driver behaviour on a range of different pedestrian facilities. This study will provide valuable information on how pedestrians and drivers behave at pedestrian facilities including traffic lights, crossings and pedestrian refuges.

The results of this study will inform public policy and guide the development of strategies for improving pedestrian safety around crossings.

*2258 SYDNEY FERRIES—Mr Peter Debnam asked the Deputy Premier, Minister for Transport, Minister for Finance—

- *2259 PUBLIC RESERVE MANAGEMENT FUND—Mr Andrew Fraser asked the Minister for Climate Change and the Environment, Minister for Women, Minister for Science and Medical Research, and Minister Assisting the Minister for Health (Cancer) representing the Minister for Lands, Minister for Rural Affairs, Minister for Regional Development—
 - (1) What is the amount of money currently held in the Public Reserve Management Fund?
 - (2) What is the total amount of money received by the fund over the past 10 years?
 - (3) What is the total number of loans given by the fund?
 - (4) How many loans are outstanding?
 - (5) How much interest has the fund earned?
 - (6) What loans have defaulted?
 - (7) What grants have been made to reserves from the fund?
 - (8) What is the annual income from reserves to the fund?

Answer-

- (1) \$14,790,756 as at 18 March 2008. However, most of this money is committed to projects approved but not paid to trust managers.

- *2260 SPEED CAMERA—EWINGSDALE—Mr Andrew Fraser asked the Minister for Health representing the Minister for Roads, and Minister for Commerce—

On how many times, between 1 May 2007 until 30 November 2007, has an RTA technical officer been required to work on the speed camera located at the bottom of the St Helena Range at Ewingsdale?

Answer-

I am advised:

During the period 1 May to 30 November 2007 the fixed speed camera at Ewingsdale was visited on at least 14 occasions by Roads and Traffic Authority (RTA) authorised officers as follows:

RTA authorised officers attended the site on 11 occasions to complete certification tests of the camera recording device as required under Section 47 of the Road Transport (Safety & Traffic Management) Act 1999. On all 11 occasions the camera recording device was certified as accurate and operating to the manufacturer's specifications.

The Ewingsdale camera site was audited on 24 July 2007 by an RTA authorised Officer. The speed measurement system and camera recording device were found to be working correctly. The site was also attended by the camera suppliers who confirmed the camera's accurate operation.

In line with the RTA's requirement of regular assessment of fixed speed cameras, a Sydney-based senior RTA technician attended the site on 12 October 2007 and confirmed the continued accurate operation of the camera.

The RTA confirms that both the speed measuring device and the camera recording device were operating accurately during the period 1 May to 30 November 2007.

- *2264 MAINTENANCE OF SCHOOLS—WAKEHURST ELECTORATE—Mr Brad Hazzard asked the Deputy Premier, Minister for Transport, Minister for Finance representing the Minister for Education and Training, Minister for Industrial Relations, Minister for the Central Coast, and Minister Assisting the Minister for Finance—
 - (1) What is the value of the outstanding maintenance at each government school in the Wakehurst electorate?
 - (2) What steps are being taken to deliver maintenance to the said schools?
 - (3) What is the anticipated date the backlog of maintenance will be cleared?

Answer—

Maintenance in schools in the Wakehurst electorate, as in all NSW government schools is an ongoing activity, constantly delivered throughout the year through a comprehensive suite of initiatives designed to best meet a range of circumstances:

- Preventative Maintenance is regular work performed by a contractor to keep specific building elements and equipment in good repair.
- Programmed Maintenance is work based on items that are picked up in the bi-annual condition assessments of each school. Annual maintenance plans are developed by schools in conjunction with their local Asset Management Unit.
- Essential Urgent Repairs are maintenance works undertaken immediately by the contractor if required by the school, with the school contributing up to its specific contribution limit.
- The Extra Maintenance Program is a four year statewide program aimed at injecting additional funding into priority areas.

The Department of Education and Training continues to work with school Principals and school communities to identify priority projects to deliver safe, well-maintained learning environments for the students of NSW.

The number of school counsellors allocated to schools in the Wakehurst Electorate for each year from 2005 to 2008 follows:

- (a) 2005—5.89 full time equivalent
- (b) 2006—6.16 full time equivalent
- (c) 2007—6.16 full time equivalent
- (d) 2008—6.53 full time equivalent

School counsellors are one component of an extensive network of support for students in government schools.

- (5) Priority clients are those inpatients with dysphagia issues and for outpatients, priority is based on individual assessment at referral.
- *2273 CORPORATE SERVICES EFFICIENCY REVIEW—Ms Katrina Hodgkinson asked the Minister for Police, Minister for the Illawarra—
 - (1) When will the Corporate Services Efficiency Review of the function and deployment of administrative staff in the NSW Police Force be completed?

Answer—

The NSW Police Force has advised me:

- (1) The Corporate Services Efficiency Review is a program of continuous improvement across the NSW Police Force.
- (2) Regular updates are provided on the various projects incorporated in the Review.
- (3) The duties of General Support Officers will be combined with those of Court Process Officers and Clerical Officers to form the new multi-skilled General Administrative Support Officer positions, available to be flexibly deployed according to the operational needs of Local Area Commands.
- (4) and (5) Staffing allocations within a Local Area Command are matters for the Local Area Commander.

- *2275 HORNSBY HOSPITAL CLEANERS—Mrs Judy Hopwood asked the Minister for Health—
 - (1) How many cleaners are employed at Hornsby Hospital?

- (2) Is the full staff complement filled?
- (3) If not, why not?
- (4) What checks are performed to ensure adequate standards of cleanliness throughout the hospital?
- (5) Are these always met?
- (6) If not, when are they not met?

Answer-

I am advised by the Chief Executive of the Northern Sydney and Central Coast Area Health Service:

- (1) to (3) There are 39 FTE cleaner positions at Hornsby Hospital. There are two cleaning positions currently vacant. One position is vacant, following the resignation of an employee. Another cleaner has been seconded to cleaning auditor duties for a period of three to six months.
- (4) A range of inspections are conducted at each facility, as part of the quality assurance process, to assess compliance with the NSW Cleaning Services Standard Guidelines for Health Care Facilities.

Internal inspections are undertaken by site Environmental Operations supervisors and managers, as well as by dedicated cleaning auditors. In addition, monthly inspections are undertaken by an independent external agency at each site.

- (5) and (6) While the Northern Sydney and Central Coast Area Health Service always endeavours to meet the cleaning standards contained within the Guidelines, the rigorous inspection regime ensures the prompt identification of areas where improvement is required. This may include the re-allocation of resources to priority areas in the event of a shift vacancy.

*2279 SCHOOL ZONE FLASHING LIGHTS—Mr Malcolm Kerr asked the Minister for Health representing the Minister for Roads, and Minister for Commerce—

What schools in the Cronulla electorate have not had flashing lights to indicate the 40 km/h school zones installed on RTA roads?

Answer-

I am advised:

All schools in NSW are considered against the selection criteria for school zone speed alert systems, including all schools in the Cronulla electorate.

The school zones to be treated are selected for the new technology rollout based on safety criteria including traffic and pedestrian volumes, crash history and crash risk. Therefore, the school zones that are at high risk will be treated first.

Four hundred school zones are to be fitted with flashing lights over the next four years, with 100 schools per year receiving the new technology. The four year school zone safety program will cost \$46.5M and will be funded by revenue from speed cameras installed in school zones.

To date, school zone speed alert systems have been installed at two locations within the Cronulla electorate. They are located at:

- Taren Point Road, Caringbah adjacent to Caringbah High School and Endeavour Sports High School; and
- Taren Point Road, Taren Point adjacent to Taren Point Public School.
- *2280 ISOLATED PATIENTS TRAVEL AND ACCOMMODATION ASSISTANCE SCHEME—Mr Daryl Maguire asked the Minister for Health—
 - (1) What steps have been taken to alter the wording on the Isolated Patients Travel and Accommodation Assistance Scheme (IPTAAS) so that it does not conflict with the wording in NSW Health's Administration Manual?
 - (2) How many patients in Greater Southern Area Health Service claiming IPTAAS have been affected due to the conflict in wording?

Answer—

I am advised:

- (1) and (2) The Member's question is ambiguous and any interpretation of the question would be subjective. I suggest the Member provide further clarification if a response to this issue is still required.
- *2281 PEDESTRIAN PRIORITY FOR TRAFFIC LIGHTS—Ms Clover Moore asked the Minister for Health representing the Minister for Roads, and Minister for Commerce—

With regard to international public space expert Jahn Gehl's comments last year that pedestrians get low priority at traffic lights in the Central Business District (CBD):

- (1) What is the average duration of all traffic lights in the CBD for which green lights are activated for pedestrians, allowing them to cross the road?
- (2) What is the average duration of all traffic signals in the CBD for which green lights are activated for cars, allowing them to cross intersections?
- (3) What is the average duration of all traffic signals in the Sydney Electorate for which green lights are activated for pedestrians, allowing them to cross the road?
- (4) What is the average duration of all traffic signals in the Sydney Electorate for which green lights are activated for cars, allowing them to cross intersections?
- (5) How many traffic lights in the CBD provide green lights for pedestrians to cross?
- (6) Of these:
 - (a) How many require pedestrians to apply to cross by pressing a push button?
 - (b) How many do not require pedestrians to apply to cross by pressing a push button?
- (7) How many traffic lights in the Sydney Electorate provide green lights for pedestrians to cross?
- (8) Of these:
 - (a) How many require pedestrians to apply to cross by pressing a push button?
 - (b) How many do not require pedestrians to apply to cross by pressing a push button?
- (9) How does the Roads and Traffic Authority determine which traffic signals require pedestrians to push buttons to apply to cross the road and which do not?
- (10) What assessments have been made to increase the number of traffic signals that allow pedestrians to cross without having to apply through pushing a button, particularly in the CBD and inner Sydney?

Answer—

I am advised:

(1) to (4) All traffic signals in the Sydney CBD and the Electorate of Sydney are controlled by the Sydney Coordinated Adaptive Traffic System (SCATS), which continually changes green time for each

approach on a cycle by cycle basis, depending on traffic volume and level of congestion. As such, it is not possible to determine an average time that an approach receives a green signal at any set of traffic signals. Similarly, pedestrian walk times are dependent on the width of the roadway being crossed and therefore walk times will also vary from intersection to intersection.

- (5) All but one signalised intersection in the Sydney CBD provide one or more walk signals for pedestrians. The intersection that does not is at the junction of the Cahill Express off ramp and Conservatorium road, where there are no connecting footpaths.
- (6) The vast majority of signalised intersections in the Sydney CBD require pedestrians to push a button to activate the pedestrian walk signal. However during pedestrian peak times, all pedestrian crossings at signalised intersections in the CBD area bounded by Eddy Avenue, Circular Quay, Sussex Street, College Street and along Oxford, William and Macquarie Streets are automatically introduced irrespective of whether the pedestrian button is pressed or not.
- (7) In the Electorate of Sydney there are a small minority of traffic signals that do not provide walk signals for pedestrians. However, the RTA now has a policy to provide pedestrian crossings across all legs of new traffic signal installations, unless there is adverse geometry such as a cliff wall or embankment on the other side of the road, or there is no way that a pedestrian can safely continue their journey.
- (8) The majority of traffic lights in Electorate of Sydney that have a signalised pedestrian crossing, require pedestrians to push a button to provide a green light for them to begin crossing, other than at the times and locations mentioned in the answer to Ouestion 6.
- (9) The current times and locations for automatic activation of pedestrian crossings in the Sydney CBD was the result of a review of pedestrian amenity that was undertaken by the RTA and Sydney City Council.
- (10) A road safety assessment of the CBD entertainment precincts has been undertaken due to the large number of higher risk pedestrians using these areas, particularly in the evening. As a consequence, additional signal sites along parts of George Street and Oxford Street have had their automatic pedestrian activation times increased.
- *2283 NATIONAL ART SCHOOL—Ms Clover Moore asked the Deputy Premier, Minister for Transport, Minister for Finance representing the Minister for Education and Training, Minister for Industrial Relations, Minister for the Central Coast, and Minister Assisting the Minister for Finance—

With respect to the long-term future of the National Art School:

- (1) What is the outcome of the taskforce, set up to identify options for the future of the National Art School, that was due to report before the end of 2007?
- (2) Will the NSW Government maintain the National Art School and its unique atelier model?
- (3) Will the NSW Government seek funds and support from the Commonwealth Government to promote the National Art School as an independent national cultural institution?
- (4) What action has the NSW Government taken to ensure the future of the National Art School since the taskforce was established?
- (5) Is the Government aware of the City of Sydney Research and Urban Cultures report proposing an arts and cultural quarter focussed on Oxford Street and Taylor Square, and what role does the Government see for the National Art School in such a precinct?
- (6) What decisions has the Government made about funds to ensure the continued operation of the National Art School?

Answer-

The Taskforce has provided its report and this is under consideration by the Government.

The Government is aware of the City of Sydney research and an Urban Cultures report.

The NSW Government is currently providing recurrent funding to the National Art School.

*2285 GOVERNMENT FUNDED INSURANCE SCHEME—Mr Jonathan O'Dea asked the Minister for Community Services—

What consideration has been given to introducing a NSW Government funded insurance scheme to assist not-for-profit community service organisations, as currently exists with VMIA in Victoria?

Answer—

In 2002 the Council of Social Service NSW (NCOSS) received funding from the State Government for a project to assist not-for-profit agencies experiencing difficulties obtaining insurance cover or struggling with increasing premiums. NCOSS now offers its members access to a 'Community Cover' Scheme, which includes public liability, association protector, property, personal accident volunteers and motor vehicle insurance.

- *2287 ASSISTANCE FOR PARENTS WITH ADULT DISABLED CHILDREN—Mr Donald Page asked the Minister for Ageing, Minister for Disability Services—
 - (1) What is the number of disabled children over the age of 30 years in NSW who are being cared for at home by their parents?
 - (2) What is the number of parents over the age of 65 years who are full-time carers for their disabled adult children?
 - (3) What is the Government doing to relieve the burden on these parents who are providing a service that would otherwise cost the Government a substantial amount of money?
 - (4) What provision is the Government making to look after adult disabled children when their parents are either too old or too sick to look after them any longer?
 - (5) How many group homes are there in NSW?
 - (6) (a) Does the Government plan to buy or build more group homes in future?
 - (b) If so, how many?
 - (7) What Government assistance is currently available for elderly parents who are caring for their disabled adult children?

Answer-

- (1) According to the Australian Bureau of Statistics Survey of Disability, Ageing and Carers 2003, the number of people with a moderate, severe or profound disability aged 30 years and above who are living with and being cared for by their parents in NSW is 6,814.
- (2) According to the Australian Bureau of Statistics Survey of Disability, Ageing and Carers 2003, the number of parents aged 65 (inclusive) and over who spend more than 40 hours per week providing care for their adult children (defined as over 18 years of age) with a moderate, severe or profound disability in NSW is 1573.
- (3) Older parent carers are a unique group of carers and the NSW Government recognises their particular needs and is addressing them through a range of measures.

The NSW Action Plan for Carers 2007-2012 includes strategies to better support older parent carers and highlights the additional services funded under a Bilateral Agreement with the Commonwealth Government.

In May 2006, the NSW and Commonwealth Governments signed a Bilateral Agreement for the provision of additional respite services for ageing parents caring for their sons and daughters with a disability. This is a joint initiative by both Governments that will see over \$48 million being made available for additional services.

The Respite for Ageing Parent Carers Program in NSW has four components aimed at providing additional respite, support and access to services for ageing parent carers of sons and daughters with a disability. The four components are:

- Flexible Respite Packages;
- Centre-Based Respite;
- Flexible Day Options for sons and daughters of older parent carers; and
- Support Coordination Program.

All components offer services specifically for parents aged 65 years and over who are caring for a son or daughter with a disability. In recognition of shorter life expectancies, higher mortality rates at all ages and earlier ageing experiences of Aboriginal people, Aboriginal parent carers aged 45 years and over are eligible to access these services.

The focus of this major funding initiative has been on increasing opportunities for respite, but the 19 Support Coordination services also offer case management, carer support and succession planning. These services are specifically targeted to older parent carers who are not currently accessing support services.

(4) As answer in (3).

Further, in May 2006, the NSW Government launched Stronger Together: A new direction for disability services in NSW 2006-2016. Supported with funding of \$1.3 billion over five years from 2006/07,

Stronger Together provides for the expansion of community support and specialist support accommodation services.

Under Stronger Together, an additional 990 specialist accommodation support places will be established over the five years from 2006/07 to 2010/11.

These services are in addition to the 1260 respite places being established over the first five years of Stronger Together.

- (5) The Department of Ageing, Disability and Home Care (DADHC) operates or funds over 600 group homes across NSW.
- (6) (a) and (b) The Government is committed to increasing the range of accommodation options available across NSW. DADHC has developed an Innovative Accommodation Framework which provides for a range of accommodation options for those requiring low levels of support and those requiring high levels of support.

These options extend beyond the group home model to include drop-in support, villas and apartments and cluster models. The Framework also provides for flexible packages which have yet to be developed in detail.

These new options will be progressively established over the next three years under Stronger Together. A total of 990 new accommodation places are being established under Stronger Together from 2006/07 to 2010/11.

(7) As above.

The 2007–08 Budget has allocated a total of \$1.894 billion to the Department of Ageing, Disability and Home Care (DADHC), an increase of \$137 million over the previous year. This includes services that will assist older carers such as:

- New therapy positions at a cost of \$3.3 million
- \$1.3 million in additional respite funding

The NSW Government, through DADHC, also provides funding support of \$528,520 per annum to Carers NSW, which is the peak body supporting the carers of NSW.

*2288 JUSTICE OF THE PEACE—ONLINE REGISTER—Mr Greg Piper asked the Minister for Health representing the Minister for Roads, and Minister for Commerce—

Can the Minister explain the Roads and Traffic Authority's inability to verify Justices of the Peace via the Attorney General's online Register, when clients produce JP certified documents for processing?

Answer—

I am advised that the RTA only accepts customers' original proof of identify documents when identifying themselves to the RTA. Certified photocopies of identity documents are not accepted due to the real possibility of unscrupulous people making fraudulent applications.

The primary purpose of the Attorney General's online service is to allow people to locate a JP in a local area or to check that another person is currently registered as a JP. It does not provide a sample signature of the JP. Checking is done by using a JP registration number, name and postcode.

Although this service provides assurance that the JP is registered, it does not provide any assurance that a document bearing a JP signature is genuine.

*2290 CITYRAIL SURVEY—Mr Greg Piper asked the Deputy Premier, Minister for Transport, Minister for Finance—

Why did the 2007 CityRail customer survey not include Lake Macquarie and Newcastle users of the Newcastle and Central Coast line?

Answer-

I am advised:

CityRail has been conducting customer surveys since the third quarter of 2006. Customers travelling from Newcastle and the Central Coast have been and are included in this sample. These particular surveys are conducted on board different trains at different times and target customers randomly.

*2291 YOUTH CRIME PREVENTION INITIATIVES—Mr Geoff Provest asked the Minister for Juvenile Justice, Minister for Western Sydney, Minister Assisting the Premier on Citizenship—

Given that the Queensland Government has developed a number of youth crime prevention initiatives, including organised sports teams, concerts, the establishment of youth action groups in different cities and drug and alcohol awareness sessions:

- (1) What youth crime prevention initiatives are currently being undertaken by the NSW Government?
- (2) What youth crime prevention initiatives are planned for NSW in the future and what are the dates on which they are expected to be launched?

Answer-

While the Department of Juvenile Justice operates a range of programs to combat recidivism for those young people who are already demonstrating a propensity for crime, the Attorney General's Department conducts crime prevention initiatives.

It is therefore more appropriate that the Member direct his question to my colleague the Hon. John Hatzistergos MLC, Attorney General and Minister for Justice, for his consideration.

*2292 SURGE BED STRATEGY—TWEED HOSPITAL—Mr Geoff Provest asked the Minister for Health—

Given that the success of the proposed "surge bed" strategy at Tweed Hospital depends on the delivery of healthcare services at home to non-critical patients and that this home healthcare service cannot begin until additional medical and allied health staff are recruited to the Tweed Hospital:

- (1) Has recruitment for medical and allied health staff positions for the home healthcare services at Tweed Hospital begun?
- (2) How many positions for this home healthcare service have been filled and how many are still vacant?
- (3) When will all medical and allied health staff positions for this home healthcare service be filled?
- (4) When is the "surge bed" strategy expected to commence at Tweed Hospital?

Answer-

I am advised:

(1) and (2) North Coast Area Health Service has implemented strategies to enhance Home Health Care Services in the Tweed Valley including an additional 2.5 permanent Fulltime Equivalent (FTE) nursing positions to provide community chronic respiratory and cardiac care programs. Also recruitment of 4.5 FTE permanent Nursing & Allied Health positions for the transitional aged care program has been completed. This program has an aged care focus and promotes care of the elderly in a community setting. An additional permanent 1.6 FTE Nursing & Allied Health positions are in the final stages of recruitment to provide more Community Health Care and Hospital in the Home Services.

Additional community packages (COMPACS) are available within the Tweed Valley. North Coast Area Health Service broker these Packages from a number of non-government organisations under the COMPACS program. These organisations provide staff to undertake specific services provided to patients in the Community.

- (3) The staffing numbers required is continually being reassessed. As more positions are added, these will be filled by recruitment. Also if existing staff leave, a vacancy will be created which will be filled through recruitment.
- (4) North Coast Area Health Service Executive is reviewing aspects of the alternative to admission bed strategies in the light of feedback received during the recent consultation with the Area Health Service's nursing staff.
- *2294 GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS—Mr Michael Richardson asked the Minister for Climate Change and the Environment, Minister for Women, Minister for Science and Medical Research, and Minister Assisting the Minister for Health (Cancer)—
 - (1) How many million tonnes of greenhouse gas emissions a year will the new coal-fired power station the Government proposes to allow to be built emit?
 - (2) How will the Government meet its target of reducing greenhouse gas emissions in this State by 60 per cent by 2050 and returning to year 2000 greenhouse emission levels by 2025 when this new coal-fired power station is in operation?

Answer-

I'm advised:

(1) The Government's target of reducing greenhouse gas emissions by 60% by 2050 takes into account the need to develop new sources of electricity to meet growing demand. Emission intensities would depend on the technology proposed to be used.

- (2) Any new power station proposal would be subject to the relevant emissions reduction targets. The Commonwealth is currently designing a national Emissions Trading Scheme, which NSW supports, which all market participants will be required to participate in.
- *2297 PARKING FINES—"OVERALL PARKING SECTOR"—Mr Michael Richardson asked the Minister for Police, Minister for the Illawarra—
 - (1) If you move your car from one spot in a metered zone to another in the same "overall parking sector" will you still be considered to be operating under the same time restrictions as reported in the Sydney Morning Herald on 6 March 2008?
 - (2) What is the definition of an "overall parking sector"?
 - (3) Would a motorist who left a metered four-hour zone after three hours, went off to see her sick mother in hospital, returned an hour later and parked in another spot in the "overall parking sector" be deemed to have parked in that sector for more than four hours and therefore be liable to be booked?

Answer—

Officers of the NSW Police Force are not responsible for the policing of parking in metered spaces. As the relevant legislation is the responsibility of the Roads and Traffic Authority, this question would more appropriately be addressed to the Minister for Roads.

- *2298 PARKING FINES—"OVERALL PARKING SECTOR"—Mr Michael Richardson asked the Minister for Health representing the Minister for Roads, and Minister for Commerce—
 - (1) If you move your car from one spot in a metered zone to another in the same "overall parking sector" will you still be considered to be operating under the same time restrictions as reported in the Sydney Morning Herald on 6 March 2008?
 - (2) What is the definition of an "overall parking sector"?
 - (3) Would a motorist who left a metered four-hour zone after three hours, went off to see her sick mother in hospital, returned an hour later and parked in another spot in the "overall parking sector" be deemed to have parked in that sector for more than four hours and therefore be liable to be booked?

Answer—

The road rules for parking are set out in the Road Transport (Safety & Traffic Management) (Road Rules) Regulation 1999, which includes the Australian Road Rules 1999.

The enforcement and interpretation of these parking rules is a matter for local councils.

- *2300 SCHOOL BUS PASSES—Mr Anthony Roberts asked the Deputy Premier, Minister for Transport, Minister for Finance—
 - (1) How many children were issued with bus passes as at 28 February 2008 from the LGAs of:
 - (a) Hunters Hill;
 - (b) Lane Cove;
 - (c) Ryde?
 - (2) If this information is not recorded by LGA then how many were issued by suburbs located within these LGAs?

Answer-

I am advised:

- (1) Student travel records are not attributed to local government areas.
- (2) In February, 2008, 9070 bus passes were issued across suburbs in these LGAs.
- *2301 FERRY TRAVEL PASSES—Mr Anthony Roberts asked the Deputy Premier, Minister for Transport, Minister for Finance—

For the years 1995 to February 2008 inclusive, how many children were issued with ferry travel passes for each of the LGAs or suburbs contained within the LGAs of:

- (a) Hunters Hill
- (b) Lane Cove;
- (c) Ryde?

Answer—

I am advised:

- (1) Student travel records are not attributed to local government areas.
- (2) The school pass database is a current entitlement database and therefore the numbers issued from 1995 to February, 2008 are not readily available.
- *2302 FERRY TRAVEL PASSES—Mr Anthony Roberts asked the Deputy Premier, Minister for Transport, Minister for Finance—
 - (1) How many children were issued with ferry travel passes as at 28 February 2008 from the LGAs of:
 - (a) Hunters Hill;
 - (b) Lane Cove;
 - (c) Ryde?
 - (2) If this information is not recorded by LGA, then how many were issued by suburbs located within these LGAs?

Answer—

I am advised:

- (1) Student travel records are not attributed to local government areas.
- (2) Ferry pass data for 28 February, 2008 has not yet been submitted by ferry operators.
- *2303 COMMUNITY TRANSPORT SERVICE TYPE REVIEW—Mr Rob Stokes asked the Minister for Health representing the Minister for Roads, and Minister for Commerce—
 - (1) How has the Community Transport Service Type Review resulted in providing better public transport to frail older people, younger people and people with a disability and their carers?
 - (2) How will the outcomes of the review impact on the public bus transport provided to serve the rapidly increasing population of frail older people in Pittwater?

Answer—

This question is more appropriately directed to the Minister for Transport.

- *2304 TRAVELLING TIMES TO SYDNEY CBD—Mr Rob Stokes asked the Minister for Health representing the Minister for Roads, and Minister for Commerce—
 - (1) Does the RTA monitor travelling times into the Sydney Central Business District from various locations in the Sydney Metropolitan area?
 - (2) Is so, what has been the average travelling time from Avalon Beach to the Sydney CBD over the last 12 months?

Answer-

I am advised:

Average travel speeds across major Sydney road corridors are contained in the NSW State Plan.

- *2305 MONITORING OF BUS TRAVELLING TIMES—Mr Rob Stokes asked the Minister for Health representing the Minister for Roads, and Minister for Commerce—
 - (1) Does the RTA monitor bus travelling times into the Sydney Central Business District from various locations in the Sydney Metropolitan area?
 - (2) Is so, what is the time it takes for the E88 service leaving North Avalon (Careel Head Road) at 7.21 am to Central Station on weekdays?
 - (3) On how many occasions has this service been running more than 5 minutes over the scheduled time over the past 12 months?

Answer-

I am advised:

Questions relating to on-time running of bus services are more appropriately directed to the Minister for Transport.

- *2306 FAMILY-SCHOOLS PARTNERSHIP FRAMEWORK—Mr Andrew Stoner asked the Deputy Premier, Minister for Transport, Minister for Finance representing the Minister for Education and Training, Minister for Industrial Relations, Minister for the Central Coast, and Minister Assisting the Minister for Finance—
 - (1) Will the NSW Government support the Family-Schools Partnership Framework?
 - (2) If so, what resources will the NSW Government provide to support the framework?
 - (3) Will these resources be extended to all schools, government and non-government?

Answer-

The NSW Government encourages parents and caregivers to play a major role in working with school staff to develop educational programs for children, and to take the opportunity to contribute at all stages of children's education.

While the NSW Government believes that parents and caregivers have a shared role in supporting the school in the education of a child, they are encouraged to choose if and how they would like to be involved

In addition to the strong relationships already evident between schools and their parent community through established parent organisations, the NSW Department of Education and Training has a number of initiatives to develop partnerships between families, communities and schools. Current resources on this matter include the Priority Schools Programs booklet Developing home, school & community partnerships which has been disseminated to all Priority Schools and used as a resource to develop strategies which build partnership and collaboration between schools and families, particularly in low socio-economic status communities. This resource is complemented by a range of other strategies designed to build and facilitate partnerships between families and schools, such as the use of Priority Schools Programs Partnership Officers, Community Information Officers and Family in Cultural transition courses which facilitate the settlement of newly arrived migrant and refugee students and their families.

The Family-School Partnerships Framework is freely available to all school communities through the Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations website.

The Family-School Partnerships Framework can be accessed by school communities as a guide and a resource, and considered along with other resources available to schools in relation to family and school partnerships. This approach provides flexibility in its use by schools and allows schools to build on their current initiatives.

- *2307 REPORT INTO TVET CHARGES—Mr Andrew Stoner asked the Deputy Premier, Minister for Transport, Minister for Finance representing the Minister for Education and Training, Minister for Industrial Relations, Minister for the Central Coast, and Minister Assisting the Minister for Finance—
 - (1) Has the NSW Government's report into TVET charges been finalised?
 - (2) Will the report be made public?
 - (3) If so, when will the report be made public?

Answer-

- (1) The report into TVET charges is nearing completion and will be made public.
- (2) The TVET rates for 2009 will be posted on the Department of Education and Training Vocational Education and Training in Schools Directorate website in August 2008, as is customarily the case.
- *2308 RURAL COUNCILS ACCESS TO CROWN LAND—Mr John Turner asked the Minister for Climate Change and the Environment, Minister for Women, Minister for Science and Medical Research, and Minister Assisting the Minister for Health (Cancer) representing the Minister for Lands, Minister for Rural Affairs, Minister for Regional Development—
 - (1) What does the Minister or the Government intend to do to assist rural councils to access Crown land to enable the residential and industrial development of such councils?
 - (2) What is the current procedure for councils to access such land?
 - (3) What is the usual time from a request from councils to access Crown land for residential or industrial development to approval or denial?
 - (4) (a) Does the Government have any proposals to shorten such time by cutting red tape?
 - (b) If so, how?
 - (c) If not, why not?

Answer-

- (1) Where a demonstrated demand exists no objections are raised to rural councils procuring suitable Crown land for residential and industrial purposes.
- (2) Council could apply to purchase the affected Crown land under the Crown Lands Act 1989 or compulsorily acquire the land under the Land Acquisition (Just Terms Compensation) Act 1991. In the latter, Council should firstly consult with the Department of Local Government to ensure that its proposal has sufficient public benefit.

- (3) For a purchase under the Crown Lands Act, the timeframe will vary depending on the circumstances. Issues to be addressed include native title if it has not already been extinguished, status of the land involved, statutory assessment, statutory advertising and the negotiation of a purchase price. The timeframe for a compulsory acquisition will depend on the efficiency of the acquiring authority.
- (4) The Department of Lands makes every effort to process such purchase applications in a timely manner.
- *2309 ADMINISTRATOR FOR COFFS HARBOUR SHOWGROUND TRUST—Mr John Turner asked the Minister for Climate Change and the Environment, Minister for Women, Minister for Science and Medical Research, and Minister Assisting the Minister for Health (Cancer) representing the Minister for Lands, Minister for Rural Affairs, Minister for Regional Development—
 - (1) What selection criteria were followed in the appointment of the administrator for Coffs Harbour Showground Trust?
 - (2) Was the position advertised?
 - (3) What remuneration is being paid to the administrator?
 - (4) How does the cost of the administrator compare with the cost of the administration of the Coffs Harbour Showground by the previous trust?
 - (5) (a) Will the administrator's accounts be audited?
 - (b) If so, by whom?
 - (6) What is the expected period of administration?
 - (7) How much money was previously contributed by the Show Society to the Showground Trust annually over the past 10 years?
 - (8) What was the reason for sacking the trust and appointing an administrator?
 - (9) Why was the Showground Trust put under administration and why was the Bellingen Showground Trust reappointed?

Answer-

- (1) The administrator of the Coffs Showground Trust was chosen because of her accounting background, her business acumen, her knowledge of the workings of the reserve, her knowledge of the local area and community and her enthusiasm and commitment to the community. She was highly recommended and appointed following an interview by departmental officers.
- (2) No.
- (3) \$62.40 per hour plus mileage.
- (4) The cost of the administrator will be more than the administration costs of the previous Trust. However, in the short time since her appointment, the administrator has already achieved significant improvement in the financial performance of the Trust.
- (5) (a) Yes.
 - (b) The administrator is yet to select an auditor.
- (6) The administrator will be given sufficient time to put the affairs of the Coffs Showground Trust in order
- (7) While the Show Society paid for/contributed towards the cost of some minor equipment, no money was contributed in the Trust.
- (8) The trust board did not have the management expertise or business acumen to properly manage this Crown reserve. In addition to being heavily in debt to the Public Reserves Management Fund, the Trust had reported substantial losses in the past two years.
- (9) Unlike Coffs Harbour, the trust board that manages the Bellingen Showground Trust has improved the financially viability of Trust over time with the advice of the Department of Lands and the support of Bellingen Shire Council.

What provisions are available to allow the community to see which licensed premises have breached licensing laws?

Answer-

The secrecy provisions of the liquor and gaming legislation prevent officers from my Department disclosing information acquired in the course of exercising a function of office or in the course of administering the legislation. That information includes enforcement action involving compliance or penalty notices issued to a licensee following the detection of less serious breaches at licensed premises.

More serious breaches are heard and determined by the Licensing Court of NSW and once listed, are matters on the public record. In this respect, my Department publishes the Court results in a regular bulletin called Liquor and Gaming that is distributed to all licensed premises and other subscribers.

Under the new Liquor Act which will commence from 1 July 2008, the Director of Liquor and Gaming has increased powers to impose conditions on licences and refer matters to the Casino, Liquor and Gaming Control Authority for prosecution. The Director will publish results of prosecution action and the imposition of licence conditions within the secrecy provisions of the legislation.

Answer-

(1) SistaSpeak is currently being rolled out across New South Wales. The workshop program was first trialled in Dubbo in 2005. Since then, SistaSpeak has been provided to young Aboriginal girls from 13 schools in areas including, Wellington, Gilgandra, Lismore, Casino, Tabulum, Umina, Vincentia and the Shoalhaven. In Term 2, 2008 the program will extend to schools in Umina, Orange,

- Campbelltown, and Rutherford. The Government intends to continue to expand the program across NSW in collaboration with local Aboriginal communities.
- (2) The evaluation of the pilot program in Dubbo Secondary College, Delroy Campus in 2005 showed that the program had been very successful, leading to significant increases in students' enthusiasm for learning and decreases in absenteeism.
