1531 ASBESTOS IN MOUNT DRUITT ELECTORATE SCHOOLS—Mr Edmond Atalla to ask the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

Which schools in the Mount Druitt electorate are currently affected by friable or loose asbestos?

1532 TV HIRE COSTS IN NEW SOUTH WALES HOSPITALS—Mr Edmond Atalla to ask the Minister for Health and Medical Research—

(1) Regarding the fees of up to \$14 per day being charged for TV hire in New South Wales hospitals by patient entertainment providers, is there a provision for the associated hospital to collect a percentage of the revenue based on overall usage?

(a) If so, what is the percentage?

(2) Considering that these fees are more than the cost of subscription services such as Foxtel, Stan or Netflix, will the Government negotiate with these providers to reduce the fees for patients?

(3) What is the Government doing to alleviate these expensive costs for patients in New South Wales hospitals?

*1565 FISH KILL LAKE PAMAMAROO BROKEN HILL—Ms Jenny Aitchison asked the Minister for Agriculture and Western New South Wales—

(1) When did the Minister become aware of the fish kill at Lake Pamamaroo in the Menindee Lakes System near Broken Hill?

(2) What is the advice of Department of Primary Industries (DPI) Fisheries Officers regarding the extent and potential cause of the latest fish kill?

(3) What DPI Fisheries resources have been deployed to Lake Pamamaroo to investigate the latest fish kill and, if possible, salvage fish stock for the Government's native species rescue and breeding program?

(4) What is DPI Fisheries' strategy to ensure the clean-up of fish kills given the Government expects there could be further incidents during summer?

Answer—

Department of Primary Industries (DPI) Fisheries staff were alerted to a potential fish kill in Lake Pamamaroo via images supplied on 8 October 2019. Further images were provided on 16 October 2019.

DPI Fisheries staff advised the fish kill was caused by declining water quality and habitat extent due to the drying of Lake Pamamaroo. From the information available, it appeared thousands of introduced European carp died.

Fish kills in the drying lakes of the Menindee system are not uncommon and previous incidents have indicated the remnant pools are dominated by European carp. Given the dominance of the pest fish within the remnant pool, as well as the limited abundance of native fish, DPI resources were not allocated as part of the native species rescue and breeding program.

DPI Fisheries is in the process of engaging contractors to assist with fish kill clean ups that may be required this summer.

*1566 MAITLAND RAILWAY ROUNDABOUT TRAFFIC LIGHT—Ms Jenny Aitchison asked the Minister for Regional Transport and Roads—

(1) What monitoring of the Maitland Railway Roundabout (New England Highway/Church Street/Cessnock Road) has been undertaken between Monday 14 October 2019 to Thursday 17 October 2019 following the switch-on of the new traffic control light for eastbound traffic entering the roundabout?

(a) What has the monitoring indicated about the impact on peak period traffic in the morning and afternoon?

- (2) What impact has the operation of the new traffic light had on traffic flow through the roundabout?
- (3) Has Roads and Maritime Services made any preparations during recent roadwork for a traffic control light to be installed on the Church Street entry to the roundabout?
 - (a) If so, when will a decision be made to install that traffic light at this location and how soon can it be installed?

Answer—

I am advised:

- (1) Transport for NSW monitored traffic queues for east and west bound traffic between 14 October 2019 and 17 October 2019.
 - (a) Initial monitoring indicates a reduction in queue lengths of about 150 metres for the afternoon peak period.
- (2) Traffic flow for westbound traffic has improved. Queues are moving quicker due to the gaps created by the eastbound traffic lights.
- (3) Traffic lights on the Church Street entry are being considered as part of the Stage Two works under the New England Highway, Cessnock Road and Church Street roundabout, Maitland project. Provisions for these traffic lights were made in the construction of Stage One works.
- (4) Transport for NSW is not able to provide a timeframe until community consultation for the proposed Stage Two works later this year.

*1567 DROUGHT ASSISTANCE INTEREST FREE LOANS—Ms Jenny Aitchison asked the Minister for Agriculture and Western New South Wales—

- (1) How many applications for interest-free loans have been received for funding under the New South Wales Drought Assistance Fund (as at 17 October 2019)?
 - (a) How many applications have been approved, disaggregated by State electorate?
 - (b) How many applications were denied, disaggregated by State electorate?
 - (i) What were the reasons for applications being denied?

Answer—

- (1) 1. 2053 applications have been received.
 - (a) 1614 applications have been approved. Applications are not processed by electorate.
 - (b) 292 applications have been denied. Applications are not processed by electorate.
 - (i) Reasons for applications being declined include the withdrawal of the application by the applicant and the eligibility of the application.

*1568 INDEPENDENT TOTAL ALLOWABLE CATCH FISHING—Ms Jenny Aitchison asked the Minister for Agriculture and Western New South Wales—

- (1) Why did the Secretary direct the Director General of the Department of Primary Industries to determine Total Allowable Catch (TAC) for the first fishing period 2019-20?
 - (a) Can the process still be called independent with the Total Allowable Fishing (TAF) committee or the Secretary of the Department of Primary Industries directing the quotas?
 - (b) How many more times in the future is the Total Allowable Fishing Committee or the Secretary of the Department of Primary Industries going to set the quotas?
 - (c) Who decides if it is the Total Allowable Fishing (TAF) committee or the Secretary of the Department of Primary Industries who sets the Total Allowable Catch (TAC)?
 - (d) How can stakeholders have an input that is independently considered if the Secretary of the Department of Primary Industries is setting the quotas?
- (2) Is only one scientific assessment for each species/species group enough to do a thorough scientific analysis?

Answer—

- (1) The previous Minister directed the Secretary of the Department of Industry to make Total Allowable Catch (TAC) determinations for 17 species or species groups for the first fishing period 2019-20. This function is delegated to the Director General, Department of Primary Industries, in accordance with statutory delegations.
 - (a) The Total Allowable Fishing Committee is a statutory and independent Committee established under the Fisheries Management Act 1994 and, in accordance with this Act, is not subject to the control or direction of the Minister.
 - (b) TAC determinations for each quota managed species/species group are required to be made for

each new fishing period.

- (c) Regulations made under the Fisheries Management Act 1994 may specify whether the TAF Committee or the Secretary is to make a fishing determination. If the regulations do not specify, the Minister may direct either the Secretary or the TAF Committee to make the determination.
- (d) The Secretary may conduct public consultation in relation to a fishing determination and take into account the results of that consultation when making a determination.

(2) Yes.

*1570 PFAS INVESTIGATIONS RUTHERFORD SITE—Ms Jenny Aitchison asked the Minister for Energy and Environment—

- (1) Has Cleanaway provided a report to the NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA) on the investigation to establish the extent of any Per- and poly-fluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) contamination sources on the site of the former National Textiles Mill in the Rutherford Industrial Estate?
 - (a) If so, what has that investigation established about PFAS on-site or affecting waterways downstream from that location?
 - (i) Have NSW EPA and Cleanaway discussed how to address this PFAS contamination?
- (2) What is the total amount of PFAS contaminated water treated and removed by Enviropacific Services from the Truegain premises at Rutherford (as at 16 October 2019)?
- (3) Has work commenced to clean-up above ground storages on the Truegain site?
- (4) Does the EPA have any indication at this time as to when the Truegain site owner will achieve full compliance with the clean-up notice for the site?

Answer—

(1) Yes.

(a) The Preliminary Site Investigation has identified PFAS contamination onsite and warranting further investigations.

(a) (i) The EPA has requested for Cleanaway to undertake a detailed site investigation, including developing management strategies.

(2) Approximately 1,700,000 litres.

(3) Yes.

(4) The EPA requires the site to be cleaned up as a priority to prevent harm to the community and the environment. The landowner has advised the EPA that it is seeking funding to continue the site clean-up. The EPA is continuing to assess the matter.

*1571 MAITLAND HOSPITAL ELECTIVE SURGERY WAIT TIMES—Ms Jenny Aitchison asked the Minister for Health and Medical Research—

- (1) What was the waiting time at Maitland Hospital for each of the following conditions, disaggregated by financial year from 2011 to 2019 (as at 17 October 2019):
 - (a) Hip replacements;
 - (b) Knee replacements;
 - (c) Cataract extractions?
- (2) Since 2011, what funding has been provided to Maitland Hospital to reduce the wait times for common elective surgeries, disaggregated by financial year from 2011 to 2019 (as at 17 October 2019)?
- (3) How many patients are currently on the wait list (as at 17 October 2019) for an appointment to see an:
 - (a) Orthopaedic specialist;
 - (b) Ophthalmologist?

Answer—

- (1) Waiting times at Maitland Hospital are allocated according to a patient's clinical urgency, with the most urgent patients seen first. The Bureau of Health Information publishes independent reports about the performance of the New South Wales public healthcare system.
- (2) In New South Wales, on time elective surgery performance remains strong and is the best in the country. The election commitment of \$76 million over four years will deliver additional elective surgeries across the state. I am advised that on top of annual budgets, approximately \$1.1 million

additional funding has been allocated to Maitland Hospital for this purpose since 2011-12, including to recruit more staff.

- (3) Waiting times at Maitland Hospital are allocated according to a patient's clinical urgency, with the most urgent patients seen first. The Bureau of Health Information publishes independent reports about the performance of the New South Wales public healthcare system.

*1572 ON-FARM EMERGENCY WATER INFRASTRUCTURE REBATE SCHEME—Ms Jenny Aitchison asked the Minister for Agriculture and Western New South Wales—

- (1) How many applications has the NSW Rural Assistance Authority received for the On-farm Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate Scheme for the following periods:
(a) 2018-19 financial year;
(b) 1 July 2019 to 30 September 2019?
- (2) What is the breakdown of funding paid by the NSW Rural Assistance Authority from the On-farm Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate Scheme for the following periods:
(a) 2018-19 financial year;
(b) 1 July to 30 September 2019?
- (3) What is the current status of New South Wales' funding availability from the On-farm Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate Scheme (as at 17 October 2019)?
- (4) Has the Commonwealth Government indicated when horticulture farmers with permanent horticulture plantings will also be able to access the scheme?

Answer—

The NSW Rural Assistance Authority (RAA) received 1214 Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate Scheme (EWIRS) applications in the 2018-19 financial year. The RAA received 1180 EWIRS applications between 1 July and 30 September 2019.

The RAA dispersed \$5.77 million under the EWIRS in the 2018-19 financial year and \$2.74 million between 1 July and 30 September 2019.

On 4 October, I announced that the Government has successfully secured additional funding for the Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate (EWIR). I also announced that the program is open to horticulturalists with permanent plantings.

*1573 NATIONAL CARP CONTROL PROGRAM PRIMARY INDUSTRIES INPUT—Ms Jenny Aitchison asked the Minister for Agriculture and Western New South Wales—

- (1) What input has NSW Primary Industries Fisheries provided to date on the National Carp Control Plan (as at 17 October 2019)?
- (2) In looking at the issue of the use of carp herpes as a biocontrol, has NSW Primary Industries Fisheries:
(a) Formed a position or provided an opinion to the Government;
(b) Sought any independent advice;
(c) Consulted with any other jurisdiction?
- (3) Has the Government considered potential budget allocations to support the National Carp Control Program should it proceed to the release of carp herpes?

Answer—

- (1) NSW Department of Primary Industries (DPI) has provided input to the development of the National Carp Control Plan (NCCP) through a range of working groups and advisory bodies. These have included the Operational Working Group that has considered the logistical and biosecurity issues surrounding the potential release of the virus and the associated clean-up requirements. DPI Fisheries representatives have also been part of the Scientific Advisory Group that oversees the various research activities informing the final development of the NCCP.
- (2) The NCCP is still under development, with many of the targeted research activities to inform the plan yet to be finalised. As such, DPI Fisheries has not formed a position on the biocontrol measure as a means to control Carp. The NCCP itself is being informed by a range of independent research and stakeholder groups, as well as multiple jurisdictions.
- (3) The Plan is a Commonwealth initiative and the Government has not considered potential budget allocations to meet any future implementation of the NCCP.

*1577 DAM HEIGHTS AND LOCATIONS—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Water, Property and Housing—

- (1) How many dams in New South Wales have a height level above 100 metres?
 - (a) Where are they located?
 - (b) What are the names of these dams?
- (2) How many dams in New South Wales have a height level between 50 metres and 100 metres?
 - (a) What are the names of these dams?
 - (b) Where are they located?
- (3) How many dams in New South Wales have a height level between 10 metres and 50 metres?
 - (a) What are the names of these dams?
 - (b) Where are they located?

Answer—

I am advised by the NSW Dams Safety Committee (DSC) that according to their register of dams across our state, there are:

- (1) Six dams are greater than 100 metres in height. They are Talbingo dam on the Tumut river, Warragamba dam west of Sydney, Eucumbene dam near Cooma, Blowering dam near Tumut, Copeton dam south of Inverell and Glenbawn dam near Scone.
- (2) 39 dams with a height between 50 and 100 metres, and
- (3) 350 dams with a height between 10 and 50 metres.

The names and locations of these dams are found in the table in Attachment A.

It should be noted that the dam numbers between 10 and 15 metres may not be complete as the DSC has for many years used 15 metres as one of its measures to determine if a dam should be prescribed under its regulatory framework.

*1578 LOCAL LAND SERVICES FEES—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Agriculture and Western New South Wales—

When the Local Land Services fees are postponed for regional communities, does the Government fill the funding void so that Local Land Services can continue to offer all services and operations, or is the Local Land Services required to cut back services and/or take on debt?

Answer—

Additional funding is provided to Local Land Services via the cluster operating grant to compensate for the rates and charges waived.

*1579 WATER CATCHMENT MONITORING CHIEF SCIENTIST RECOMMENDATIONS—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Water, Property and Housing—

- (1) Following the May 2014 Report of the New South Wales Chief Scientist and Engineer titled 'On measuring the cumulative impacts of activities which impact ground and surface water in the Sydney Water Catchment', has the Government implemented in part or whole any of the five recommendations to:
 - (a) Create a whole-of-catchment data repository;
 - (b) Develop a whole-of-catchment environmental monitoring system;
 - (c) Commission computational models which can be used to assess the impacts on quantity and quality of surface water and groundwater;
 - (d) Encourage the use of data visualisation tools for examining 3D representations of the catchment;
 - (e) Establish an expert group to provide ongoing advice on cumulative impacts in the catchment?

Answer—

I am advised:

- (1)
 - (a) WaterNSW is responsible for the collection and management of monitoring data from its catchment monitoring system.
 - (b) Each year WaterNSW reports on the work and activities in the catchment area. Under its operating licence, WaterNSW has specific annual reporting requirements for its catchment management activities.
 - (c) WaterNSW operates its own series of quantity models developed for surface water and the

supply system.

- (d) No.
- (e) The Government established an Independent Expert Panel for Mining in the Catchment to provide advice on a range of matters relating to mining in the Special Areas of the Greater Sydney Catchment. The Independent Expert Panel for Mining in the Catchment (the IEPMC) has completed its Final report and delivered it to the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment (DPIE). DPIE has made the report publicly available and will review and respond to recommendations in due course.

*1580 WATER QUALITY TESTING AT WORONORA DAM—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Water, Property and Housing—

- (1) In relation to water drawn from the Woronora Dam, what chemicals are currently added to the water to ensure its suitability for human consumption (as at 17 October 2019)?
- (a) Over the past 10 years, has the volume and ratio of any chemicals added to the water increased or decreased to ensure that the water continues to be fit for human consumption?
- (i) Which chemicals have increased or decreased and in what way has their use changed?
- (2) How many complaints have been received regarding the water quality from Woronora Dam each year for the past 10 years (as at 17 October 2019)?
- (a) What are the five most common concerns raised (as at 17 October 2019)?
- (3) What tests are carried out to check the water as it enters the filtration system?
- (a) At what locations across the Woronora Dam is water quality tested?
- (b) How frequently are these tests undertaken?

Answer—

All treatment processes including chemical additions are continuously monitored in accordance with the Quality Management System to meet the Australian Drinking Water Guidelines. During the treatment process, lime, carbon dioxide, ferric chloride, cationic polymer and non-ionic polymer (LT20) are added (coagulation – bound together) and then removed during filtration. For final disinfection, small amounts of chlorine and ammonia are added. Fluoride is then also added to promote dental health as set out by NSW Health under the Department's water quality requirements.

This entire process ensures the water supplied to the community remains free of any waterborne pathogens and is safe to drink.

(a) The volume and ratio of chemicals used can vary due to the intake of rainfall and dam storage levels. These fluctuating factors can affect the raw body of water's alkalinity (base level), hardness, apparent colour (colour resulting from the true colour and any particulate matter or turbidity) and turbidity which measures the water's cloudiness caused by suspended matter in the water.

(i) Ferric chloride and cationic polymer dosing are typically required if changes are needed to reduce the raw water's colour and turbidity. Instances with higher levels of turbidity and/or high colour water require additional amounts of ferric chloride and cationic polymer to be added.

Lime and carbon dioxide dosing meanwhile typically increases after rainfall and decreases when dam levels fall. This is due to evaporation rates which increase the raw water's alkalinity and hardness. There is no identifiable trend for the need to increase or decrease chemical usage.

There has been no overall change in chemical usage other than the fluctuations described above.

*1581 MONITORING OF WARATAH RIVULET—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Water, Property and Housing—

- (1) Who is responsible for testing of water quality along the Waratah Rivulet of the Woronora Dam?
 - (a) Who has access to the results of any such testing?
 - (b) Are the results available to the public?
- (2) How many points along the Waratah Rivulet are tested or monitored?
 - (a) How frequently is any such testing or monitoring undertaken?
- (3) Is there any record of aquatic ecosystems along the Waratah Rivulet being damaged?
 - (a) If so, what is the nature of any such damage and how can a report on any such damage be sourced?

Answer—

I am advised:

- (1) Peabody Energy Metropolitan Mine is required under its planning approval granted in 2009 to implement water quality monitoring along the Waratah Rivulet. The management plans and monitoring reports as well as independent environmental audit reports are available to the public on the company's website.
- (2) Surface water quality sampling has been conducted monthly since 2008/2010 at 10 sites. WaterNSW has been conducting routine monitoring in the Waratah Rivulet since August 2006.
- (3) The Annual Review reports prepared by Peabody Energy present monitoring results for aquatic ecosystems. The annual review reports are available to the public for download from the company's website.

*1582 PIPELINES AND TREATMENT PLANTS BUILT SINCE MARCH 2011—Mr Clayton Barr asked the Minister for Water, Property and Housing—

- (1) What are the locations of the 14 pipelines across New South Wales that have been built since March 2011 as referred to by Minister for Water, Property and Housing in Hansard on 15 October 2019?
 - (a) When was each of these pipelines commenced?
 - (b) When was each of these pipelines completed?
- (2) What are the locations of the 40 sewerage treatment plants built since March 2011?
 - (a) When was each of the sewerage treatment plants commenced?

- (b) When was each of the sewerage treatment plants completed?
- (3) What are the locations of the 31 water treatment plants built since March 2011?
- (a) When was each of the water treatment plants commenced?
- (b) When was each of the water treatment plants completed?

Answer—

I am advised:

The Government has made substantial investment in water infrastructure projects throughout regional New South Wales. This investment has been delivered through current and historic infrastructure grants programs such as the Country Towns Water and Sewerage Program, the Water Security for Regions Program and the Safe and Secure Water Program.

As an example, since the establishment of the Government's Safe and Secure Water Program, Government funding has been committed to more than 110 projects with a total Government investment of more than \$680 million.

In addition to this program, since the start of this drought the Government has invested more than \$130 million in water infrastructure and emergency water carting, helping our regional communities cope with drought.

*1583 LANDCARE COORDINATORS—Mr Roy Butler asked the Minister for Agriculture and Western New South Wales—

- (1) How many Landcare Coordinators are funded under the Government's Landcare Program?
- (2) Where are these coordinators located?
- (3) Will these Landcare Coordinator positions be funded to full time equivalent hours during this unprecedented drought?

Answer—

- (1) There are currently 69 part time Local Coordinator roles and 12 part time Regional Coordinator roles funded by the NSW Government's Landcare Program.
- (2) The Local and Regional Coordinators are located right across New South Wales, servicing all Landcare network areas. The roles are hosted by 49 local Landcare Groups, Industry organisations and Councils.
- (3) The Landcare Program supports the equivalent of 30 full time roles, implemented across the program at various levels ranging from 0.25FTE to 1.0FTE.

*1584 FINANCIAL EDUCATION AT NEW SOUTH WALES HIGH SCHOOLS—Mr Roy Butler asked the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

- (1) Does the current New South Wales high school curriculum contain requirements for education in financial responsibility and future financial planning?

In New South Wales, all students undertake mandatory study of Mathematics from Kindergarten to Year 10. It is a requirement of the Mathematics K-10 syllabus that students develop financial literacy. Students develop knowledge, understanding and skills about money, financial transactions, investments and income.

In addition to their study of Mathematics students in Years 7-10 may elect to study Commerce. This course provides opportunities for students to learn about financial responsibility and future financial planning, for example consumer and financial decisions, earning an income, spending and saving income, borrowing money, managing finances, investing money, investment planning, superannuation, and the financial considerations involved in running a business such as being a sole trader and Pay As You Go.

 - (a) 18% recorded with a factor of fatigue, 13% recorded with a factor of speeding, 5% recorded with a factor of alcohol (factors are not mutually exclusive).

The Centre for Road Safety only reports on crashes recorded by NSW Police Force, in which at least one person was killed or injured, or in which at least one motor vehicle was towed away.

It can be used on all modes of public transport and is available for adults and children. The Opal One Day Travel Pass was developed in consultation with organisations that support people who are homeless or vulnerable. There are currently 79 registered purchasers.
(2) There are currently no plans for any other prepaid Opal products that could be provided to specialist homelessness services.

- *1592 POTENTIALLY TOXIC SLAG WASTE AT STOCKTON BEACH—Mr Tim Crakanthorp asked the Minister for Energy and Environment—

Of the seven developments that have notified the Hunter Central Coast Development Corporation that they may potentially claim against the Newcastle Mines Grouting Fund since the Fund's creation, only two developments have reached the threshold. The total amount expended from the Fund to 17 October 2019 is \$1.318 million. Between 1 July 2019 and 17 October 2019, there have been no funds spent from the Fund.

*1594 SMART BATTERIES FOR KEY GOVERNMENT BUILDINGS PROGRAM—Mr Tim Crakanthorp asked the Minister for Energy and Environment—

The Sydenham to Bankstown open space corridor is partially located within the Bankstown electorate. The residents located within the Bankstown electorate will benefit from the work being undertaken by the NSW Government and City of Canterbury Bankstown in all three corridors.

Council is currently reviewing funding agreements and is expected to commence the master planning work late this year or early next year.

The Bill does not wholly shift the burden of proof. The Bill seeks to enhance and provide a robust and efficient road safety regulatory framework that considers both photographic evidence of illegal mobile phone use and an alleged offender's evidence that the object is not a mobile phone if they choose to take the matter to court.

*1609 LISMORE ELECTORATE COOLER CLASSROOMS PROGRAM AIR CONDITIONING INSTALLATION—Ms Janelle Saffin asked the Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education representing the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning—

- (1) Further to my previous question LA Q1130 on the New South Wales Government Cooler Classroom Program and your answer given on 25 September 2019, can you explain why Bonalbo Central School and Nimbin Central School are the only schools in the Lismore Electorate which will have new air conditioning installed by summer 2019 under this program?

The next step is design of their Cooler Classrooms works, which is scheduled in Term 4, 2019.

*1610 ON-FARM EMERGENCY WATER INFRASTRUCTURE REBATE SCHEME LISMORE ELECTORATE—Ms Janelle Saffin asked the Minister for Agriculture and Western New South Wales—

The Western City & Aerotropolis Authority (the Authority) has and will continue to collaborate with various stakeholders to explore opportunities in the development of the Aerotropolis and Western Parkland City.

The Western Sydney City Deal Delivery Office and the City Councils of Camden, Campbelltown, Liverpool and Wollondilly have worked closely with the Illawarra Shoalhaven Joint Organisation of Councils and the Illawarra RDA as they developed the Western Sydney and Illawarra Shoalhaven Roadmap to Collaboration. This Roadmap was launched in September 2019 and outlines a framework for the two regions to work together to unlock the significant opportunities being generated by the Western Sydney City Deal, the development of the Western Sydney (Nancy-Bird Walton) International Airport and the emerging Aerotropolis.

(4) The Authority is currently in the planning and development stages of the Aerotropolis. The Authority has focused on attracting investment that will secure a pipeline of high-value job creation across the Western Parkland City.

(5) (a)- (c) With a once-in-a-generation opportunity to shape the transformation of the Western Parkland City, the Authority will collaborate with all three levels of government, industry and the community to help deliver this vision.

Through key commitments listed in the Western City District Plan and the Western Sydney City Deal, \$20 billion of Commonwealth and State Government investment has already been committed to projects across the Western Parkland City.

As development of the Aerotropolis and Western Parkland City progresses, growing investment, business opportunities and jobs will continue to be a key priority for the Authority.
