- (a) Under the 2019 Small and Medium Enterprise and Regional Procurement Policy, agencies were permitted to purchase up to a maximum of \$10,000 from any supplier, including where there is a whole-of-government arrangement in place. There was no requirement for agencies to report this information.
- (b) Under the 2019 Small and Medium Enterprise and Regional Procurement Policy, agencies were permitted to purchase goods or services valued up to \$50,000 directly from a small business, even where those goods or services are available on a whole-of-government arrangement. There was no requirement for agencies to report this information.
- (c) Under the 2019 Small and Medium Enterprise and Regional Procurement Policy, agencies were required to first consider purchasing from an SME whenever direct procurement was permitted, up to a value of \$250,000.

For contracts under \$150,000 there was no requirement for agencies to report this information.

The NSW Government spent approximately \$40 billion on goods, services and construction in 2019/20, with around 43.4% (\$16.3 billion) spent with more than 60,000 small and medium businesses.

Data for 2020/21 is still being finalised.

A refreshed SME and Regional Procurement Policy came into effect on 1 July 2021. Under this policy there are additional measures designed to increase SME participation in procurement opportunities within the NSW Government and improve economic, ethical, environmental and social outcomes through a range of initiatives. These measures include:

- SME First Agencies must first consider purchasing from a SME supplier whenever direct procurement is permitted, up to a value of \$3 million.
- SME and Regional Exemption Agencies may purchase goods or services up to a value of \$150,000 directly from a SME or Regional Supplier, even where these are available on a whole-of-government arrangement.
- SME and Sustainability Criteria For procurements over \$3 million over the life of the arrangement, including single supplier standing offers, agencies must include a minimum 10% of the non-price evaluation criteria for SME participation and 10% to support for the NSW Government's economic, ethical, environmental and social priorities.
- SME & Local Participation Plan For contracts over \$3m suppliers will be required to submit a SME & Local Participation Plan which references SME and NSW specific content and to report on compliance with the plan quarterly.

- * 7386 WATER, PROPERTY AND HOUSING—IRRIGATION WATER METER CHANGES—The Hon. Rod Roberts to ask the Minister for Mental Health, Regional Youth and Women representing the Minister for Water, Property and Housing—

- * 7387 HEALTH AND MEDICAL RESEARCH—PEOPLE PASSING AWAY AT HOME FROM COVID-19— The Hon. Rod Roberts to ask the Minister for Mental Health, Regional Youth and Women representing the Minister for Health and Medical Research—
 - (1) During a number of press conferences in relation to the COVID-19 pandemic we have been informed by the Government of several people who have died at home from the COVID-19 virus:
 - (a) What is the criteria for hospital admission for a person infected with the COVID-19 virus?
 - (b) How many people who have died as a result of COVID-19 in their homes were rejected for admission to a Hospital?
 - (c) Why were the people who died at home from the COVID-19 rejected for admission to a hospital?

Answer-

(1)

(a-c) The Agency for Clinical Innovation Guideline Caring for adults with COVID-19 in the community sets out the escalation points for patients to be referred for in-hospital care. Currently, patients who meet these criteria, or are at high risk of deterioration based on clinical assessment, are pre-emptively admitted to hospital for closer observations.

To date, no patients have been denied access to higher levels of care or admission to hospital.

- * 7388 MENTAL HEALTH, REGIONAL YOUTH AND WOMEN—COVID-19 MENTAL HEALTH PANDEMIC—The Hon. Rod Roberts to ask the Minister for Mental Health, Regional Youth and Women—
 - (1) Many experts are predicting serious mental health issues for New South Wales residents as a result of the COVID-19 restrictions. These mental health issues are especially prominent for children who have been home schooling with stressed parents and who are absent from their friends:

- (a) What is the Government doing now to reduce the impact of mental health issues as a result of the COVID-19 restrictions?
- (b) Does the Government have a long term plan to address this imminent mental health pandemic?
- (c) What additional resources has the Government allocated to mental health care since implementing COVID-19 restrictions?
- (d) What is the estimated future costs to address the mental health issues that have resulted from the COVID-19 restrictions?

Answer-

(1)

(a-d) In the past two years, the NSW Government has increased its investment in mental health from \$2.1 billion in 19/20 to \$2.6 billion in 21/22. A NSW Government record investment of \$10.9 billion will support mental health services over the next four years.

In early 2020, the NSW Government invested \$80 million to strengthen mental health services across the state. The package included:

- Support for vulnerable populations by recruiting specialist, community-based mental health clinicians and peer support workers
- Expanding virtual mental health servies to connect clinincal settings within and across districts to enhance capability to assess and treat mental health clients remotely.
- Enhancing the capacity and responsiveness of the Mental Health Line
- Expanding the PACER model
- Enhancing therapeutic activities in acute inpatent units
- Access to Tresillian's Sleep Well Baby app
- Establishing a residential supported living service using the Habilis model
- Expanding Lifeline to respond to the increase needs of the community

The NSW Government's 2020-21 Budget also committed \$66.2 million over three years to continue the additional specialist mental health clinicians recruited in response to COVID-19, plus a further \$50.4 million over three years to continue to provide technology-enabled workforce and expand the telehealth services.

To address the expected uptick in demand for mental health services, a joint Commonwealth and NSW Government investment of \$17.5 million was announced in July 2021. The package focuses on boosting crisis and mental health support to vulnerable communities during COVID-19 lockdown and will support:

- Headspace outreach support to parents and young people across greater Sydney
- The Sonder app to provide anyone subject to a mandatory 14-day isolation order with 24/7 health and wellbeing support for the entire duration of their isolation period
- Support for Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) communities, with a focus on communities in South West and Western Sydney.
- Primary Health networks across Sydney to increase their mental health services across all areas
- Lifeline to boost crisis counselling services
- Gidget Foundation to provide counselling services for parents suffering from perinatal depression and anxiety
- Free access for 8,000 new parents to the Tresillian SleepWell baby app
- Kids Helpline to extend online wellbeing sessions to secondary schools

• The Butterfly Foundation to provide additional support for young people with or at risk of an eating disorder and their carers

Following this, the NSW Government announced a further \$1.5 million towards the Moderated Online Social Therapy (MOST) platform designed by youth mental health organisation Orygen. The NSW Government has also supported the familyproject.org.au, a one stop shop for all families to help them maintain family connections and improve mental wellbeing with a variety of free resources and activities.

In addition to this, the Federal Government has publicly announced \$10.6 million funding for Head to health pop-up clinics.

The NSW Government continues to plan for the changing mental health and wellbeing needs within the community over the long term as restrictions ease.

- * 7389 PREMIER—HEALTH ADVICE—The Hon. Rod Roberts to ask the Special Minister of State, and Minister for the Public Service and Employee Relations, Aboriginal Affairs, and the Arts representing the Premier—
 - (1) The Premier has been stating each morning in her press conferences that she is following health advice when implementing restriction in relation to the COVID-19 pandemic:
 - (a) Will the Premier release the health advice that she has relied upon to implement restrictions in relation to the COVID-19 pandemic?
 - (i) If not, why not?

Answer-

The NSW Government continues to respond to the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic. NSW Health released modelling from the Burnet Institute on 6 September 2021.

- * 7390 SPECIAL MINISTER OF STATE—NUMBER OF PEOPLE WHO HAVE LOST THEIR JOBS IN NSW FOR BEING UNVACCINATED FOR COVID-19—The Hon. Rod Roberts to ask the Special Minister of State, and Minister for the Public Service and Employee Relations, Aboriginal Affairs, and the Arts—
 - (1) A number of reports are being made in relation to people losing their jobs as a result of not being vaccinated for COVID-19:
 - (a) As of 6 September 2021:
 - (i) How many people in New South Wales public service have lost their jobs as a result of not being vaccinated for COVID-19?
 - (b) How many people in the New South Wales public service does the Government expect will lose their jobs as a result of not being vaccinated for COVID-19?
 - (c) What steps is the Government taking to ensure people in the New South Wales public service do not lose their jobs as a result of not being vaccinated for COVID-19?

Answer-

COVID-19 vaccination mandates in the NSW public service are limited as follows:

- Ministry of Health employees are required under the Public Health (COVID-19 Vaccination of Health Care Workers) Order 2021 to have received one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine by 30 September 2021 and the second dose by 30 November 2021.
- Public service employees that fall into the category of an authorised worker from one of the 12 restricted LGAs in the Public Health (COVID-19 Additional Restrictions for Delta Outbreak) Order (No 2) 2021 are required to have received one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine by 19 September 2021.

Public service employees are expected to comply with the relevant public health orders in the conduct of their duties.
