- * 0999 ROADS—DOUBLE-DEMERIT PERIODS—The Hon. Tania Mihailuk to ask the Minister for Jobs and Tourism, Special Minister of State, Minister for Roads, Minister for the Arts, and Minister for Music and the Night-time Economy—
 - (1) Can the Minister advise, is there evidence for the effectiveness of double-demerit periods for improving road safety?
 - (a) If so, please provide details?
 - (2) Are there any plans to conduct a review of double-demerit periods to increase the evidence base for their effectiveness?
 - (a) If not, why not?

Answer—

I am advised

The Demerit Point Scheme in NSW is based on a nationally agreed system and is designed to encourage safe driving and act as an incentive to drive within the law, in conjunction with enforcement and public education campaigns.

Demerit point schemes have been shown to shift unsafe driver behaviour, particularly as drivers move closer to their demerit point limit.

Monitoring since the introduction of demerit points in 1997 indicates there is strong community support and self-reported behaviour change during holiday periods.

The doubling of demerit points during public holiday long weekends increases the incentive for drivers to drive safely and obey the law during a time where there is increased crash risk due to higher volumes of traffic on the road network, with many motorists also travelling longer distances or on unfamiliar roads as they travel for holidays.

Crash analysis demonstrates the ongoing effectiveness of double demerit points in NSW in conjunction with enforcement and public education campaigns operating during holiday periods. Analysis conducted by Transport for NSW shows that average fatalities per day are lower during double demerit periods than periods outside of double demerits.

Double demerit points fall over periods where travel on the network is higher due to school holidays or long weekends. This means a greater number of people are exposed to risk on the network which drives increased trauma. Double demerits are one of the mechanisms that deter risk taking behaviour during these higher risk periods.

Based on the above, there are currently no plans to review the double-demerit periods.

The Attorney General referred the *Anti-Discrimination Act 1977* to the NSW Law Reform Commission (**NSWLRC**) for review on 19 June 2023. The Terms of Reference for this review are available on the NSWLRC's website:

The Terms of Reference do not specify a due date for the review to be completed. However, I am confident the NSWLRC is best placed to balance the complex and comprehensive task it has been given.

Answer-

I am advised:

For privacy considerations, I am unable to comment on specific details of individual patient care.

I have been assured that clinicians providing care follow protocols aligned with the International Society of Heart/Lung Transplantation recommendations, and the Transplant Society of Australia and New Zealand guidelines.

- * 1002 ATTORNEY GENERAL—VILIFICATION PROVISIONS ANTI-DISCRIMINATION ACT—The Hon. Tania Mihailuk to ask the Treasurer representing the Attorney General—
 - (1) Can the Minister advise, what steps has the Attorney-General taken, or will take, to ensure that the vilification provisions in the Anti-Discrimination Act will not be used for frivolous or vexatious actions, particularly in light of the recent amendments to include religious belief or activity (or lack of religious belief of activity) as a protected ground against vilification?

Answer—

I am advised:

Under the *Anti-Discrimination Act 1977* (the Act) vilification complaints are made at first instance to the President of the Anti-Discrimination Board. The Act includes provisions that govern how a complaint is made and when it may be declined. These provisions include:

- Section 88, which provides standing requirements for making a vilification complaint. These requirements mean the complainant must have or claim to have the characteristic (without sufficient reason to doubt) that is the ground for the complaint.
- Section 89B, which allows the President of the Anti-Discrimination Board to decline a complaint for several reasons, including if no part of the conduct complained of could amount to a contravention of the Act.
- Section 92, which allows the President to decline a complaint during investigation if the President considers that the complaint is frivolous, vexatious, misconceived or lacking in substance.

The NSW Law Reform Commission is currently conducting a comprehensive review of the Act. This review will consider all aspects of the Act, including the adequacy and accessibility of complaints procedures and remedies, and the powers and functions of the Anti-Discrimination Board of NSW and its President.

Yes, the Minister for Health and Minister for Regional Health has received representations about this case, including from Dazelle's family, and has provided a considered response.

I have been assured that the clinicians providing her care have followed protocols aligned with the International Society of Heart/Lung Transplantation recommendations, and the Transplant Society of Australia and New Zealand guidelines.
