- * 1272 YOUTH JUSTICE—YOUTH JUSTICE 2023-24 BUDGET—The Hon. Aileen MacDonald to ask the Special Minister of State, Minister for Roads, Minister for the Arts, Minister for Music and the Night-time Economy, and Minister for Jobs and Tourism representing the Minister for Customer Service and Digital Government, Minister for Emergency Services, and Minister for Youth Justice—
 - (1) Page 2-4 of the Budget Paper No. 3 Infrastructure Statement, states that \$72.5 million over four years to 2026-27 for the Sustaining Capital Infrastructure Program Phase 2 will support critical infrastructure upgrades across the Department of Communities and Justice, providing investment in Audio Visual Link facilities and enhancements of courthouses, correctional facilities and youth justice facilities:
 - (a) Can the Minister please advise how much is funding is allocated year by year for each youth justice facility which will receive critical infrastructure upgrades?
 - (i) For each facility, what specifically will be upgraded?
 - (2) Please advise if, apart from funding for the Sustaining Capital Infrastructure Program Phase 2, is there any other funding for maintaining and enhancing youth justice facilities?
 - (a) If so, how much funding is allocated for each facility, for each year?
 - (i) What is the specific nature of the maintenance or enhancement?
 - (3) Please advise if there are any changes to funding for youth justice programs in the 2023-24 Budget?
 - (a) If so, please provide a breakdown by program by year?
 - (i) What are the specific increases or decreases in funding each year?

Answer-

I am advised:

- * 1273 GAMING AND RACING—\$100M GAMBLING SPEND IN 2023-24 BUDGET—Ms Cate Faehrmann to ask the Special Minister of State, Minister for Roads, Minister for the Arts, Minister for Music and the Night-time Economy, and Minister for Jobs and Tourism representing the Minister for Aboriginal Affairs and Treaty, Minister for Gaming and Racing, Minister for Veterans, Minister for Medical Research, and Minister for the Central Coast—
 - (1) In the 2023-24 NSW Budget, the Government has made a commitment to gambling reform with \$100 million to support an expanded cashless gaming trial, the delivery of harm-minimisation programs, and gaming reform, can the Minister advise is this the \$100 million paid by Star Casino as a result of the Bell Review into Star Entertainment?
 - (a) What is the breakdown of how the \$100 million is being spent year on year, including how much is being spent on the cashless gaming trial?
 - (2) In reference to the \$100 million in (1), can the Minister confirm if this is being used to cover the costs and expenses of the Independent Panel on Gaming Reform and its work?
 - (a) Please provide a detailed breakdown of all expenses?
 - (3) What harm minimisation programs and services and other work is being paid for by the \$100 million?
 - (a) Please provide a detailed breakdown for each program, service and other work?

- (4) What programs and services and other works in the area of 'gaming reform' are being paid for out of the \$100 million in reference to (1)?
 - (a) What is the detailed breakdown of the specific programs and services being funded, year by year?

Answer-

- (1) Yes.
 - (a) The \$100 million has been allocated to:
 - \$10 million additional investment in 2023-24 for the Responsible Gambling Fund, through the Office of Responsible Gambling, for the provision of GambleAware counselling and support services, awareness and education campaigns, initiatives like Reclaim the Game, and to support world-leading gambling research.
 - \$6.4 million to enhance self-exclusion and introduce third-party exclusions in pubs and clubs.
 - \$3.4 million for the independent expert panel, established in July this year, to run and evaluate a 12-month cashless gaming trial in pubs and clubs, with expressions of interest recently called for venues to take part.
 - \$21.7 million each year, for three years from 2024-25, to fund other gambling harm minimisation initiatives and reforms, including those recommended by the Independent Panel.

 - (a) In addition to running and evaluating the 12-month cashless gaming trial, the \$3.4 million allocated to the Independent Panel will cover costs associated with remunerating the Panel's Executive Committee (comprised of the Chair and two independent panel members) and the panel member with lived experience; and minor costs associated with meetings and the timely and secure provision and storage of meeting papers and other relevant documentation.

- * 1274 TREASURER—TREASURER 2023-24 BUDGET—The Hon. Damien Tudehope to ask the Treasurer—
 - (1) Noting that the 2023-24 Budget projections for surpluses in 2025-26 and 2026-27 are premised on contributions to the NSW Generations Fund (NGF) resuming in 2024-25, can the Minister advise:
 - (a) What are the estimated contributions to the NGF for each financial year from 2024-25 to 2026-27?
 - (i) Please breakdown by source, including royalties, dividends and windfall taxes?
 - (b) What does Treasury estimate the budget outcome for financial years 2025-26 and 2026-27 to be if contributions to the NSW Generations Fund do not resume at all during the forward years?
 - (2) Noting that the 2023-24 Budget states that "TAHE [the Transport Asset Holding Entity] will transition from its current operating model as a statutory State-Owned Corporation to operating as a non-commercial public non-financial corporation" and that this is claimed to result in lowering "net debt by \$4.3 billion in 2026-27":
 - (a) Please provide the calculations resulting in the conclusion that transitioning TAHE to the new model will lower net debt by \$4.3 billion in 2026-27?
 - (b) What is the most recent valuation of TAHE's assets measured using an income approach in accordance with TPP21-09 Valuation of Physical Non-Current Assets at Fair Value and AASB 13 Fair Value Measurement?

- (i) What is the allowance for depreciation for 2023-24 based on that valuation?
- (c) What is the estimated valuation of TAHE's assets measured using current replacement cost?
- (d) What would be the allowance for depreciation based on a valuation of TAHE's assets using current replacement cost?
- (3) The 2023-24 Budget includes provision of \$572.3 million for "converting 1,112 full-time equivalent nurses and midwives, positions which were funded temporarily to June 2024, to permanent" positions, can the Minister advise:
 - (a) What is the estimated average annual salary for these 1,112 full time equivalent positions?
 - (b) What are the additional employee related costs per full time equivalent position?
 - (c) How many years does the \$572.3 million cover the employment of these 1,112 full time equivalent positions?
 - (d) What other costs, if any, are covered by the \$572.3 million?

Answer-

The budget papers include detailed information on budgeted expenses, revenue and capital expenditure. This includes detailed financial statements including as they relate to the NGF and TAHE.

Answer—

 - (a) The Gas Roadmap will provide clarity to industry and households on gas decarbonisation, including supporting business and household electrification and energy bill reduction.
- (2) As per (1) above, the Government will deliver a Gas Roadmap in this term of government and, as part of the Roadmap's development, will consider including targets.
