* 2070 POLICE AND COUNTER-TERRORISM—RECENT NSW POLICE WORK—The Hon. Susan Carter to ask the Minister for Agriculture, Minister for Regional New South Wales, and Minister for Western New South Wales representing the Minister for Police and Counter-terrorism, and Minister for the Hunter—

- (1) What were the length of the shifts that police officers working overtime hours at the Palestinian Action Group Protests worked on the following dates:
 - (a) 25 February 2024?
 - (b) 17 February 2024?
 - (c) 11 February 2024?
 - (d) 4 February 2024?
 - (e) 28 January 2024?
 - (f) 21 January 2024?

- (2) How many interns work within the NSW Police Force?

Answer—

I am advised:

- (1)
 - (a)-(h) All police officers worked an eight hour shift.
- (2)
 - (a)-(b) No interns work within the NSW Police Force.
- (3) Since October 2023, the NSW Police Force has been meeting weekly with event organisers and other government agencies and stakeholders to ensure event activities are undertaken with minimal disruption and impact on the non-event community where possible.
- (4) I am advised that the NSW Police Force regularly meet with event organisers, government agencies and other stakeholders regarding protest activity.
- (5) The NSW Police Force is not currently organising or facilitating any operation targeting the illegal supply of alcohol to businesses in NSW.
- (6) NSW Health is the relevant regulator in NSW with NSW Health inspectors monitoring compliance and enforcement. The NSW Police Force's primary efforts in addressing e-cigarette use by young people are focused on diversion through education. Youth engagement officers deliver educational programs at schools to raise awareness about the legal and health impacts of vaping.

- (1) How many interns work within the Department of Communities and Justice?

Answer—

I am advised:

- (1) The Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ) runs a Stepping into Internship program facilitated by the Australian Network on Disability. The Stepping Into Internship program is a paid

internship opportunity for university students with a disability. This program is the only DCJ wide internship program offered.

- (2) Legal Aid NSW does not fund Community Legal Centres NSW (CLCNSW) from its own resources. It administers state and federal Community Legal Centres (CLC) Program funding on behalf of the Commonwealth, NSW Government and Public Purpose Fund. Funding to CLCNSW is published in the Legal Aid NSW Annual Report each year.
 - (a) CLCNSW is funded to deliver peak services to community legal services in NSW including the Aboriginal Legal Access Program services, accreditation scheme services, information sharing and collaboration services, member services, sector development services and systemic advocacy services. CLCNSW also receives project funding for sector initiatives including a First Nations Cadetship Program, external Employee Assistance Program, and training packages.
- (3) Yes.
 - (a) A funding arrangement has existed since the 2011/12 financial year.
 - (b) CLCNSW must work in partnership with Community Legal Centres Australia to deliver the National Accreditation Scheme across NSW. This includes assessing centres against the National Accreditation Standards and requirements of the National Accreditation Scheme and developing, monitoring, and reviewing any agreed improvement plans with community legal centres.
- (4) Legal Aid NSW monitors and assesses the performance of CLCNSW on an ongoing basis.
 - (a) CLCNSW has met its obligations under the funding agreement.
- (5) July 2021.
- (6) The National Accreditation Scheme including its escalation arrangements are managed by the Community Legal Centres Australia and the state and territory peak bodies.
- (7) Two centres have provided my office with feedback concerning CLCNSW.
- (8) Legal Aid NSW will comply with the complaints and review processes in the funding agreement.
- (9) The previous NSW Government allocated funding to CLCNSW including accreditation services from 1 July 2019 to 30 June 2025.
- (10-12) Concerns about CLCNSW and accreditation arrangements have been raised with my office.
- (13) The NSW Government is not in a position to announce the future service delivery arrangements for CLC services in Far West NSW while the procurement process is underway, in accordance with the NSW Government Procurement Policy Framework. The future service delivery arrangements for Staying Home Leaving Violence fall within the portfolio responsibilities of the minister for the Prevention of Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault.
- (14) NSW Government does not prescribe or restrict the salaries and wages community legal services pay their staff. CLCs are solely responsible for their personnel under CLC Program funding agreements, including complying with laws relating to employment, salaries and wages, and entitlements. CLCs are also responsible for managing their CLC Program budget and delivering services within the available resources.

Legal Aid NSW complies with the Government Sector Employment Act 2013 (NSW) which provides a framework for employment and workforce management and its employees are paid in accordance with the Crown Employees (Public Sector- Salaries 2022) Award.

* 2072 HEALTH—NSW HEALTH WORKERS—The Hon. - (1) What are the average weekly hours worked by doctors at the intern and resident levels within New South Wales?

Answer—

I'm advised:

In the 2023-24 financial year to date, interns worked on average 40 hours per week and Resident Medical Officers worked on average 51 hours per week.

In 2024, 1,062 interns were allocated intern positions via the medical intern allocation process administered by the Health Education and Training Institute (HETI). All eligible medical students were allocated intern positions.

NSW pays all interns under the Public Hospital Medical Officers (State) Award 2023. There are no unpaid intern positions, therefore no interns are working for 'course credit'.

Round 4 of the Medical Research Support Program (MRSP) 2024-2028 was launched on 13 May 2024 with a budget of up to \$160 million over 4 years.

- (1) In relation to Bourke High School, for its 123 students in 2023, how much did the school receive in total government funding?
 - (a) How much did the school receive in equity program funding?
- (2) With teacher numbers of 27.2 and 41.2 staff overall at the school, how were important milestones in the Vocabulary and Reading initiative missed and the MacqLit intervention reading program delayed, as per the school's 2023 Annual Report?
- (3) Why, as per the school's 2023 Annual Report, were various numeracy professional learning initiatives employed with limited success?
 - (a) Why has there been "a lack of staff buy-in" in the teaching of maths at the school?

Answer—

Bourke High School is a Connected Communities school which serves a small isolated community in the far north west of NSW. By positioning schools as 'community hubs', the strategy supports the delivery of key services to students and families through government and non-government inter-agency collaboration, in some of the most complex locations across NSW.

Bourke High School received \$7,166,611 in the 2023 Calendar Year, which included \$1,027,112 in Equity Funding. Schools assess their performance against their improvement targets which feeds into updates to each school's Strategic Improvement Plan. The department also assesses performance against the measures when determining additional support for schools.

In reference to cohort sizes and in line with the Education Act 1990, school results must not be publicly revealed in a way where the results of individual students could be identified. The number of individuals in each testing cohort was below the threshold for reporting.

The department is working with schools to increase student attendance after the impacts of COVID-19, and the specific challenges faced in some communities. Schools have set new attendance improvement measures for 2024-2027.

Bourke High School promotes and monitors regular attendance at school and has measures in place to record attendance and follow up student absences promptly. The school follows the School Attendance policy which details the management of non-attendance.

Attendance support and targeted strategies to improve attendance for students at risk of disengaging is provided for the school.

Answer—

I'm advised:

The data collected by NSW Ambulance for inter-hospital transfers is categorised by appointment and treatment. Data related specifically to inter-hospital transfers for diagnostic purposes is not collected.

In Hunter New England Local Health District for the period 1 July 2023 - 3 May 2024, the Patient Transport Service scheduled, dispatched and completed:

- 5029 inter-hospital transfers for specialist care (612 undertaken by partner providers)
- 6432 transfers for appointment attendance (479 undertaken by partner providers).

From 1 June 2023 to 3 May 2024, there were 6,090 non-emergency transports from hospital to hospital within Hunter New England Local District for treatment.

From 1 June 2023 to 3 May 2024, there were 56 non-emergency transports (priority 5 and 6) from hospital to hospital within Hunter New England Local District for appointment.

The Single Digital Patient Record program is primarily focused on implementation within the NSW Health system. It will replace multiple disparate systems that are in use today and provide significant benefit to staff, patients, and carers.

As part of successful contract negotiations with Epic, the Single Digital Patient Record program supplier, NSW Health has procured the technical capability to share data with other states and territories. However, to utilise this capability with other jurisdictions, policy and legislation changes will be required. In addition, the other jurisdictions would also need to have similar technical capabilities in place.

NSW Health's Patient Flow Portal system is a statewide platform that is already used by ACT Health and Network with Victoria to manage inter-hospital transfers. This can potentially be used by other jurisdictions to support cross border data sharing on inter hospital transfers. The NSW Health Interfacility

Transfer Process for Adults Requiring Specialist Care policy directive requires all NSW public facilities including third schedule hospitals to use the portal for the management of inter hospital transfers.

The Patient Flow Portal is also used by clinicians for initiating and managing patient transfers. This system is being upgraded to support the sharing of medical timeframes associated with interhospital transfers, rollout of the ability to reserve patient transfer (following the successful completion of the pilot at Hunter New England Local Health District), and booking of taxis and rideshare for ambulant patients managed by HealthShare NSW.

In addition, eHealth NSW statewide Remote Access Service can potentially be used by interstate jurisdictions to facilitate access to the Patient Flow Portal and data sharing to manage inter-hospital transfers, similar to what was implemented for ACT Health.
