Politicians across the political spectrum are recognising that the live sheep trade should be phased out as quickly as possible, with structural adjustment support provided to affected farmers to move into more ethical sectors. In September 2022, the New Zealand Parliament passed a bill banning all live export of animals by sea, taking effect from April 2023. As well as the significant animal welfare issues involved with continuing the live export trade, the New Zealand government was concerned about the damage to the country's reputation and brand. Despite overwhelming evidence of repeated, systemic animal welfare violations, recurring scandals and disasters, Australia remains engaged in the live export trade at the expense of countless animals and our national reputation. Most live export ships leave Australia without an independent observer on board to monitor compliance with animal welfare standards. A recent independent opinion poll commissioned by the RSPCA found that over two thirds (67%) of respondents wanted an end to the live export trade, regardless of where they lived. Western Australia, which produces and exports most of the sheep in the trade, had the highest level of opposition at 70%. These results are consistent with other polls showing that a clear majority of Australians do not support the live export trade and want to see it phased out as soon as possible.

We can learn from these examples and develop strategies that both protect animal welfare and support our farmers.

I am opposed to the continuation of the live animal export from Australia on animal welfare grounds. National live animal exports represents a tiny percentage of the total revenues from sheep and cattle. Of total revenues of about \$8b for the sheep industry less than \$100m is generated from live exports. With respect to cattle: of \$11b exported about \$1.2b, approximately 10% came from live exports. Inspite of claims to the contrary maritime animal transporters are not putting in the effort need to ensure the welfare of all animals shipped overseas. Until this happens there is no room for live exports. Also, there are significant economic benefits of slaughtering animals in northern australia once the appropriate facilities are built.
