Question Taken On Notice 1

How many incidents (from the mid-1980s to 2007) involved firefighting foam, along the Great Western Highway in the Blue Mountains.

Answer

• FRNSW records identify 3 incidents that involved firefighting foam between 1986 and 2007 on the Great Western Highway, Medlow Bath.

Question Taken On Notice 2

How many incidents (from the mid-1980s to 2007) involved firefighting foam, along the Great Western Highway in the Blue Mountains.

Question Taken On Notice 3

What is the FRNSW blood testing program testing for? Is it for all PFAS within blood?

Answer

• The FRNSW PFAS Blood Testing Program will test for 28 PFAS Analytes, including PFOS and PFOA (known components of AFFF).

Question Taken On Notice 4

How many experts are available to provide PFAS remediation services? Who is competing with the NSW Government for these expert services?

Answer

- FRNSW has successfully procured remediation services via an open expression of interest process. The process resulted in several providers capable of providing the required services.
- FRNSW is not able to provide broader comment on the availability of remediation services.

Question Taken On Notice 5

What is the process for a firefighter to report their health concerns/conditions from PFAS exposure? Does FRNSW keep data on these reports to track health implications across the agency?

Answer

• All injuries, illnesses, near mises or exposures are reported and recorded through an online system (or paper based prior to 2010). Monitoring of health risk and/or conditions is undertaken via the Health Screening program.

Question Taken On Notice 6

How many firefighters have requested PFAS blood testing?

Answer

• The PFAS blood testing program will commence in the coming months which will call for EOI from firefighters who wish to participate.

Question Taken On Notice 7

What research and guidelines on PFAS exposure is FRNSW currently using? (other than the National Health and Medical Research Council guidelines).

Answer

- The Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water PFAS National Environment Management Plan 2.0.
- National Environment Protection Council National Environment Protection (Assessment of Site Contamination) Measure. The potential health impacts of PFAS will remain consistent regardless of exposure source (occupational or non-occupational). In accordance with this health guidance is taken from the relevant health authorities in our jurisdiction including state and federal health departments.
- FRNSW continues to monitor international publications for the latest peer reviewed research.
