I live in an area bordering the Royal National Park, south of Sydney, which has particularly rich bird life. Both next door neighbours own pet cats, and neither are kept inside either during the day or at night. This is a big problem. Owners of pet cats are defensive and do not admit to their cats killing birds, small lizards or ring-tail possums, but I have seen the dead animals and taken injured birds to the vet. We have worked hard to make our property a haven for birds, particularly small birds like fairy wrens, and whipbirds but the neighbours' cats stalk the birds in our garden and there's nothing we can do about it. Areas around National Parks and sensitive bushland areas should be cat free, both feral and pet. I realise cat ownership can't be outlawed overnight, but the aim must be to reduce cat ownership with a view to eliminating it areas surrounding National Parks over the next cat generation (approximately 7-16 years). No new cats should be allowed, and all cats in the meantime should be kept within the boundaries of their owners' homes. Policies such as night time curfews can be introduced, but cats also kill during the day, s this would only be of limited value. We need a huge amount of public education about responsible cat ownership. I would recommend government-funded or subsidised de-sexing for cat owners, with a strong message about phasing out cat ownership.

Harsh measures to control cats have not been proven to be effective in keeping wildlife protected, rather, we can see that human practices are the real culprits, as shown by the instigation of such measures in Victoria their failure. Hi Thank you for considering my submission. I'll keep it brief. It would be refreshing to see government adopt an approach which deals with the cause of a problem rather than a reactive strategy of popular politics which seeks quick wins with special interest groups and plays whackamole with the symptoms. To reduce the issue of stray cats we need to start 'upstream': 1. stop breeding which doesn't meet regulations (cats must be desexed and microchipped and there must be financial consequences for non-compliance). 2. mandatory desexing (except in approved circumstances, see 1. above) must be enforced 3. owners (and prospective owners) must be educated - obligations, responsibilities, awareness of the need for containment/available options AND consequences for non-compliance. Cruelty to any sentient being should not be tolerated and it certainly should not be condoned or encouraged. If poisons, such as those inflicted on rabbits, dingos and dogs are developed to specifically target those animals and we are told they do not effect other animals feeding on those infected carcasses, why can't sterilisation baits be developed for feral animals? This would be a much kinder, cheaper and effective method to gain population control and eradication. Killing feral animals has not reduced the population to date. Cat protection agencies have been requesting compulsory desexing, licensing and microchipping of cats for years. The current microchipping system is ineffectual. It should be a national system, administered by one body, with the ability to easily update, for example a change of address or the date of decease. This will allow the scanning of microchips to give an immediate result. More money should be spent on council rangers working at night to catch domestic cats, with owners having to pay a fine for not containing their cats at nighttime. A bigger fine should be payable on any feral cats found with identification. I also don't believe any cat breeding facilities should be permitted.

My concern is for all the cats that are currently being dumped. We have lived in Baulkham Hills for 24 yrs and never had a problem with stray cats until about 18months ago. Local houses have been rented, and then sold the properties developed. People have moved out, and I am surprised at those when asked how their cats were coping with the move, are quite happy to say they left them behind and I shouldn't be concerned because "cats can fend for themselves". It was becoming a big problem so I took it upon myself to trap these cats, check for microchips (there were none), and then pay for the cat to be desexed. I ended up doing this for 11 cats. I now keep 3 inside, rehomed 4, and the other 4 are being fed by myself and neighbours. Problem solved - no more kittens or male cats fighting. I have a bird bath and the same number of birds still visit and we have not seen any evidence of dead wildlife. Education, and desexing being made compulsory is my suggestion for helping solve the problem.

Although if caught the owner should not be protected from a fine, I believe for infrequent offences, the punishment should stay on a monetary basis and not extend to the destruction of the pet, unless the cat is not identifiable or the owner refuses to pay the fine. I'd the cat is allowed to escape more than say four times a year, the council should be able to remove the cat from the owner.

I acknowledge that feral cats are a problem, but the solution to that problem cannot be cruel and inhumane shooting and poisoning programmes. Feral cats only exist because there is no mandated desexing programme in NSW, nor a mandated cat enclosure programme. I would like to see people being educated in terms of the actual statistics of wildlife threats by cats , when there are more deaths to wildlife caused by other means - humans being the chief perpetrators. An education program will help to stop any cruel and unwarranted behaviour towards cats. Personally , I keep my cat indoors in the evening . During the day I tie an orange high viz trip of fabric around his collar so birds will spot him. (Birds have acute vision and can spot an ant from 20 stories up and will see colour before they hear a cat bell) This simple method has been shown to reduce bird kills by 87%. I also have a disc around his collar that is solar powered . It lights up a bright green at night and think this helps in terms of wildlife seeing a cat on approach. These simple measures are cost effective and go towards saving the wildlife from attack

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I would suggest that once or twice a year local councils be encouraged to hold pet awareness days. Combining local vets, charities like RSPCA and Animal Welfare, food companies like Pet Barn and Pet Circle where pet owners can obtain information on caring for animals and desexing services. I have been working closely for a cat rescue organisation since 2006 and my thoughts are:

EDUCATING THE PUBLIC ABOUT RESPONSIBLE PET OWNERSHIP is one of the most effective ways of reducing cat wandering and abandonment. After all, it is people who let cats stray or abandon them that cause the problems in the first place. Having cats de-sexed and keeping them indoors (advising this causes no harmful effects on them and keeps them safe from ticks and snakes etc.) goes a long way to preventing feral cats and loss of wildlife by feral or owned cats. If children are taught responsible pet ownership in schools – perhaps by rescue organisations holding workshops, this would result in more responsible adult ownership. Governments would be better off spending money this way and with free or subsidised desexing programs.

FREE OR SUBSIDISED DESEXING PROGRAMS are of enormous help in cutting down the cat population and preventing strays and abandoned cats from parenting kittens. It results in less feral cats in the wild as many pregnant cats are dumped in the bush. Even though predators may kill some of the litter, usually one or two can survive.

BAITING AND KILLING CATS over the long term has been proven not to work! It has been happening for years with very little results and some of the methods are very cruel and some are not good for our wildlife either. Desexing Programs and education do work.

There is no doubt that the welfare and management of urban stray cats is a concern in most Australian communities. 80-100% of cats ending up in pounds are strays and 50% of those are kittens. On average 50% entering pounds and shelters are killed. The word 'feral' is used to describe all stray cats, but in reality only 1-2% are truly feral in urban areas - it's a combination of owned, semi-owned and un-owned cats. Whilst cat management is clearly a growing issue, the process of culling cats, is expensive, ineffective and cruel. The toll it takes on the people tasked with the job of killing them is unimaginable. Policymakers who promote culling as a solution, are never the ones who have to go through the trauma of killing healthy animals. Current research is proving that community cat programs, being trialled in four council areas across four states, is working. Targeted desexing of all cats is cheaper for councils, reducing kittens being born and over time reducing the number and problem of urban strays. TNR should be the standard instead of being illegal throughout Australia and if the science were considered instead of sensational, inaccurate claims about the widespread 'feral' cat problem, there might actually be a real solution to a very real problem.

Living on the fringe of the township mean that we witness daily the roaming of pet cats. They are skilful hunters of prey - that is in their DNA. We have witnessed their impacts on both birds and reptiles. I am not against cat ownership. It should be a principle under NSW Law that the owner of a cat should be responsible 24/7 for the cat and preventing it from harming anything or anyone - particularly native wildlife. If a cat is not confined to its premises, then it should only be allowed out under strict supervision of its owner e.g. on a lead like a dog. Any cat that is roaming without an ownership tag should be destroyed humanely. Thank you for this opportunity.

A NSW Government-commissioned report supports large-scale desexing programs instead, showing that killing programs are ineffective. The recent NSW Pound Inquiry has recommended a proactive solution: providing grants to councils and rescue organisations to fund large-scale, targeted desexing programs across the state, including community cat desexing in areas with large homeless cat populations, especially disadvantaged communities. These kinds of programs are a long-term, compassionate solution that reduces stray cat populations without demonising cats. The best solution is helping semi-owners and owners in disadvantaged areas by providing free desexing and microchipping through programs like the Community Cat Program. Proactive community cat programs have been scientifically proven to reduce stray cat populations, decrease nuisance complaints and prevent wildlife predation. The Rand myth of domestic cats & urban wildlife provides a helpful summary of common misconceptions and effective solutions such as desexing for managing cats and reducing the number of homeless cats. When creating policies for reducing feral and community cat populations, it's essential to consider the Vacuum Effect, an ecological principle demonstrating that removing animals from an area only results in new animals filling the space. Without addressing the root causes of population growth, removal efforts are unsustainable and ultimately ineffective.

Culling a species that prolifically breeds and is very well adapted to survival in many environments doesnt make sense. There is white box woodland around my house and also a lot of native shrubs, there are nearly always a lot of small native birds around my house yard. They nest sometimes quite low to the ground in bushes. Occasionally it clicks that there are not as many small birds around the house yard as there usually is. Setting a cage trap usually results in catching a feral cat. I also sometimes get feral cats living in my machinery and hay sheds, patches of bird feathers are a giveaway. I probably catch and humanely euthanize a feral cat perhaps every couple of months. I am not sure if these cats are born feral or dumped and turn feral. Recently there was a loud noise outside the house at night time and a look with a torch spotted a cat heading across the yard with a full grown tawny frogmouth in its mouth. This was very distressing. I believe that there needs to be control measures put in place for feral cats. Control of cats also needs to apply to domestic cats, for some reason a lot of cat owners think that their cat has a right to go wherever it likes and kill whatever birds, reptiles or other natives that it likes.

As a former RSPCA worker, I witnessed first hand the overwhelming number of calls from residents concerned about stray cats giving birth in or around their backyards. This issue contributes to the growing problem of cat colonies in many communities. To effectively manage, local councils must be responsible for stray cats (any cat that is not microchipped) and offer the following 1. Free desexing Programs - Councils can run free desexing programs, targeting both stray cats and domestic cats whose owners may not have the financial resources for desexing. This long term approach would help curb the growing number of strays in the community. 2. Trap-Neuter-Return Program, implementing TNR programs allows for the humane trapping, desexing and returning of stray cats to their colonies. Over time this reduces the population growth without resorting to euthanasia. Cats that have been desexed should have a tattoo in their ear. 3. Public education campaign - fostering responsible pet ownership and informing the public about the importance of de-sexing and not abandoning cats. 4. Our native wildlife urgently needs effective government cat containment policy legislation. Community members currently observe powerlessly cats killing wildlife in their own properties with no legal means of stopping them, until we have cat containment legislation. Dogs are not allowed to wander uncontrolled and neither should cats. The RSPCA recommends cat containment for their own and wildlife's safety. The toll of cats on our wildlife is catastrophic and extensively documented. Education programs about caring for companion cats emphasising the safety point of RSPCA policy can accompany legislation. The effectiveness of large scale desexing programs to reduce the number of homeless cats are also demonstrated, however need to be in conjunction with government cat containment legislation, in order to address the disastrous impacts cats are having on threatened native species.

Name: Ms Paula Searle

Cats are one of the main introduced predators to NSW yet the current laws in NSW give very little protection to our native wildlife and other domestic pets from roaming cats. These domestic cats are allowed to roam freely 24 hrs a day and no restrictions apply, to protect our wildlife and our domestic pets from these savage, unsupervised hunters.

I personally have lost pet budgies housed inside my house because of domestic cats roaming outside a screen door where they were housed terrifying them to death, but because they were a "domestic" cat there was nothing I could do to keep them out of my own garden, nor from my own yeranda.

The law needs to be changed immediately because why do domestic cats receive such protection over and above wildlife & other domestic pets.? This is not ethical nor humane for pets or wildlife. Full containment laws is the only action that prevents cats from hunting for fun, and constantly disturbing the life of our wildlife, and other other pets.

The only long term solution to controlling widespread feral species is gene drive technology. see https://piperlab.science.unimelb.edu.au/

Whilst novel and in development this technology should be the focus of investment as all other control measures are transitory in effect and therefore ongoing forever. Gene drive technology has the potential to solve the problem at best or require on-going small scale management at significantly less cost than current lethal control methods. Furthermore, this technology would far outweigh the impact of current methods as it would impact a significant proportion of the population across vast areas and therefore have a greater positive effect on native wildlife.

I commend the NSW Parliament for their initiative in having this inquiry. I am a small animal veterinary practice owner and practitioner in the inner west. Haberfield Veterinary Hospital. I am also a member of the AVA and contributed to their submission.

My practice is impacted by the significant numbers of unowned cats left on our doorstep as well as seeing the impacts of unowned roaming cats....Damage to wildlife, cat bites and spread of infectious diseases. This imposes a financial and emotional burden on my practice and staff. RSPCA, Council, CP soc etc won't take these cats as they say it's not their responsibility. It's certainly not mine. Many practices refuse to take care of abandoned cats leaving staff in a difficult position and obliged to take them home rather than see them suffer. This is not fair. My practice keeps them to rehome but it sometimes takes months to achieve as these are almost always non socialised cats and often unwell.

The Companion Animals Act needs to be reformed asap so that local authorities can take responsibility for these .cats. Especially so that local authorities can pick up these cats from vet practices.

Cats have a significant impact on wildlife, particularly after fires and action to control feral cats in a humane way is essential.

1.9 million reptiles, 1.2 million birds, 3.2 million mammals, 3 million invertebrates and at least 0.25 million frogs killed per day in Australia by roaming cats. These programs are shown to reduce and manage stray cat populations. Any bills or programs that play place restrictions on cats, such as curfews, encourage and embolden vicious members of our community to harm cats. I have direct experience with this, with residents in my surrounding areas deliberately seeking to harm cats they encounter because they believe they can or just don't like them. I was alerted to this inquiry via a Facebook post from the cat rescue organisation The Mini Kitty Commune (Sydney), of which I am a regular sponsor. I have attached a copy of that FB post. I agree with their sentiments. Through that FB post, I was also alerted to a position paper by the RSPCA (attached to this submission). I also agree with the RSPCA's position. I believe 24/7 containment is detrimental to most cats' physical and mental health. However, I believe a night time curfew may be reasonable. If a mandatory containment rule is enacted for domestic cats, I believe that a lot of cats may be dumped or surrended by people who cannot afford to abide by the rules, due to financial hardship (cost / difficulty of building cat barriers) or other issues. This will be a major stressor for cat rescue organisations, pounds etc and end up with the killing of large numbers of healthy cats. My other major concern is that indoor-only cats that escape their home accidentally may be harmed or killed by cat haters instead of being surrendered to a vet or pound for proper processing, using the mandatory confinement law as an excuse to harm cats found outside. As a veterinarian I write with a priority for animal welfare. I am exposed repeatedly to the negative impact of roaming cats, treating native wildlife and the cats themselves. When examining cats it is regular for veterinarians to see cat fight wounds and abscesses, eye trauma sometimes necessitating enucleation, fractures and massive trauma resulting from vehicle strikes and dog attacks, snake and tick envenomation, and communicable diseases, such as FIV, which are all over-represented in cats that are allowed to wander. Wildlife presented with cat attack wounds will frequently require extensive treatment at the cost of the clinic, often in the clinician's own time, with this responsibility and burden then passed on to wildlife carers. For many others euthanasia will be the only viable option to preserve welfare. These situations put further pressure on the already overburdened veterinary workforce, in which national staffing shortages and a mental health crisis persist. The burden extends to the pet owners suffering the financial and emotional impact of injured and ill cats. Mandatory containment of cats would go a long way to reduce these issues, and can be enacted in a way that will not reduce enrichment and stimulation in the cats' lives, while promoting further engagement with pet owners and honouring the human-animal bond.

More education (eg. This fine could be gradually increased every time the same cat is trapped at night. Numbers should be limited and a hefty licence fee imposed to stop backyard breeding. Monitoring breeders should be mandatory and kitten litters limited to a minimum. When you consider the amount of tax free money being made per litter it would make sense to audit breeders and have them taxed on their income. One litter alone can provide up to \$40,000 to a breeder. In the case of feral and stray cats, the issue is much more complex (however, numbers of abandoned cats may decrease over time if breeders are limited to litter numbers). That is why it is so important to find a humane answer to this question. We need a better solution that trapping, poisoning or other inhumane alternatives. Please spare a thought for not inflicting unnecessary pain or suffering on cats. They are sentient beings (please refer to the UK Parliament 's recent determinations on this matter.) Because of the complexity of this issue, I would ask that more scientific research is needed into domestic cat behaviour. While observations can provide information about particular instances, one cannot generalise from case studies.. This research should be aimed at what measures can be taken to address this issue. Consideration of what humane solutions have been utilised overseas would also be beneficial. It is essential that such research is conducted by researchers who have been trained in empirical methodologies. We need a carefully considered solution, not a knee-jerk reaction. So many cats have been harmed and killed by people who hate them (welfare organisations, such as the RSPCA, can attest to this.) Please do not allow individuals to have the power to trap cats.

Certainly, cats should be mandatorily de-sexed and micro-chipped, and should not be allowed outside the home at night. It should also be mandatory for cats to wear collars with loud bells. If these measure are put in place, wildlife and native birds are effectively protected. Unfortunately, many of the difficulties that arise with cats becoming feral originate not because of the animal itself but through the irresponsible or lazy behaviour of humans. These individuals, not their animals, should suffer legally enforceable penalties. It's an uncomfortable fact that most animals in the natural animal world exist by attacking and consuming other animals, with a natural population balance resulting when unnatural external factors are absent. Against this background, companion animals, including cats, pose a very small risk to wildlife – a risk that can be easily managed through responsible practices by owners. It is a very peculiar logical inversion that many who claim to support wildlife are quite comfortable with the idea that cruelty to cats (baiting, trapping and other inhumane and ineffective methods) provides some sort of countervailing 'benefit' for wildlife. I have been a cat owner my entire life. I have had around 10 cats. Of those 10, only 2 have been hunters. The other 8 were complete couch potatoes and just weren't interested. Of the 2 cats that were hunters (both black and white, interestingly), one was a farm cat so kept the rabbit population down slightly, the other a city cat and once I realized he was a hunter I chose to lock him in overnight. I believe cats are like humans and each have vastly different personalities. Some are killers but the majority are not. Blanketing them all with the 'killer' label just isn't accurate. It should be up to the owners to police them and do the right thing. Putting a blanket ban on all cats isn't the answer. Maybe cats that live on the edge of a national park need to be contained at night, but cats living elsewhere shouldn't need to be. Keeping them locked inside all the time isn't good for their mental health. I don't live in a suburb with many stray cats but I know there are lots in certain areas. The government should be doing more to trap and neuter them. As a country we don't seem to have a good TNR program like they do overseas. Roaming cats need to be contained under strict regulatory conditions and fines applied to those who do not control their cats movements. Populations of threatened ground dwelling species have very little chance of escaping predation. Chicks and marsupial joeys are always extremely vulnerable. It is well known that even one small puncture wound from a cat will result in the death of the predated animal. No amount of education of cat owners will prevent those substantial number of people who could not care less that their cat roams and hunts wildlife. Many of them being in denial. The community at large are sick of the weak laws and regulation holding cat owners to account. There is nothing more distressing to find injured and dead native wildlife caused by cats and finding that the owners keep allowing their cats to roam. I have been the owner of one cat.

I have a neighbour who claims to own one cat but who habitually feeds a number of cats and when challenged by a Council Ranger, claimed that these cats are feral.

Cats breed in this neighbour's premises. There are regular litters of kittens. Over the years I have taken at least 10 cats to our local pound where they are euthanised.

I purchased a cat trap for this purpose but have tired of the process.

I have found dead birds and dead blue-tongue lizards in our yard that have been killed by cats.

All these cats run free 24 hours per day.

These cats urinate and defecate in the premises of the surrounding houses and even on front door mats. The stench is sometimes remarked on by visitors to our house.

The suggestion that this is inappropriate cat management is ignored.

The attitude appears to be, "this is my house so I do what I like"!

I have doubts about the local council"s ability to deal with such recalcitrance.

I am a responsible cat owner. I have a harness for my cat and I take him for walks outside, just like dogs get walks. There is no excuse for people to let their cats outside because "they get bored or depressed inside". This is not a good enough excuse to allow cats to roam freely outside. I have a big property and we have a lot of possums at night. I have 3 times in the past 2 years come across an injured or dying possum or native bird and taken it to a WIRES vet. I have been informed it is most probably an injury from a cat, and cat saliva can kill them. it's very distressing to see the damage they can do to other wildlife. It angers me to see neighbours' cats roaming freely in my yard, especially when I previously owned a rabbit and had a secure run for him in my back yard to let him exercise. I would get a visit from a neighbour's cat, and this would stress him immensely and if I had not been there, the cat could have severely injured or killed him. My pets should have the right to feel safe and secure in my back yard, as well as wild animals.

People should be made to keep their cats in a cat run in their own back yard or inside at all times to stop their cats causing such carnage to our wildlife. A cat run will give ample room for the cats to roam on the grass for exercise, but confined to that cat run so they are not able to get out onto the street or into their neighbours yards and cause death to our native wildlife (which I might add is becoming less and less as more people start owing cats which they allow to roam anywhere. Thank you and I hope something will be done about this cat problem.

In our neighbourhood and backyard we have abundant native wildlife, including blue tongue lizards, rainbow lorikeets, ring tail possums, and more. We have sadly witnessed neighbours cats kill, after prolonged and painful "play", all of these species. It is more common than not that cat owners in Australia allow their cats to be outside day and night.

We also have a rural property which we actively manage for wildlife conservation, and we are also avid bushwalkers. In both of these settings we have witnessed the carnage that cats cause our native wildlife.

I am submitting a request that parliament enact legislation addressing these 2 aims:

1: compelling owners to keep domestic cats indoors 24 hours a day.

2: fully funding a radically more effective strategy to control feral cats.

I feel cat indoor rules need to be enforced as it already is in most other States and Territories.

I work for local council as a Bush Regenerator western Sydney.

We quite often witness bird kills especially with fledglings and lower perching birds such as tawny frog mouths.

Within our own suburban back yard I have recorded 13 different cats during the night over a two week period.

I observed cats urinating on outdoor furniture and vegetables and herb gardens renders our outdoor space and garden unappealing to use.

I have found dead lizards and birds in our yard with wounds consistant with cat attacks.

We installed a bird bath which has become a place for cats to lay and stalk birds. We no longer fill the bird bath for this reason.

Quite a few of our neighbours have cats they do not allow in their own homes however are happy for them to roam in other people's yards and adjacent Bushland.

Please educate people in conserving our wildlife and implement rules.

If you really want to take care of the feral population then give rescue groups and rescuers better funding and support.
