Submission to the Joint Select Committee on Arts and Music Education and Training in New South Wales

Executive Summary

Short+Sweet Deadly proposes a comprehensive First Nations arts initiative designed to nurture talent, preserve cultural heritage and create a sustainable platform for First Nations voices in the Australian arts scene.

This multifaceted program spans various age groups and artistic disciplines, focusing on short-form storytelling and performance. With the addition of 5-minute and 10-minute playmaking to the curriculum, the program will empower First Nations students to tell their own stories and share them on stage with their family, school and community.

The initiative aims to establish and develop a regular season of First Nations work (S+S Deadly) as part of the annual Short+Sweet Festival at Turner Theatre (TAFE NSW Ultimo Campus) commencing March 2025, simultaneously creating a pipeline for professional development and performance opportunities.

Key Components (Enquiry Points a.i, a.ii, a.iv, a.vi, b.v, b.vi):

- **Primary Level (8-12 years):** Introduction to storytelling, character development, dialogue creation, and basic artistic skills through a First Nations 5 Minute Playwriting Program.
- Secondary Level (13-17 years): More advanced play making, writing and stagecraft through a First Nations 10 Minute Playwriting Program.
- **Tertiary Level:** Working with TAFE NSW to create a series of Beginner to professional-level training in various artistic disciplines.
- **Short+Sweet Deadly Masterclass program:** An extension of Short+Sweet's free program since it was established in 2002, providing education and professional development for emerging and established artists.
- **Professional Development**: Creating a pathway from student to professional artist through various initiatives, including internships, work experience, and touring programs.
- **Community Engagement:** Collaborating with First Nations Elders, cultural advisors, and organizations to ensure cultural authenticity and community involvement.
- International Expansion: Developing opportunities for showcasing First Nations works globally through Short+Sweet festivals and international tours.





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This program not only aims to nurture talent and preserve cultural heritage but also to create a sustainable platform for First Nations voices in the Australian arts scene, with the ultimate goal of establishing a permanent First Nations Theatre Company by 2030.

Detailed Submission

Introduction

Short+Sweet aims to establish a regular season of First Nations work as part of S+S Deadly at Turner Hall, starting in March 2025. S+S Deadly will be established as an independent First Nations led organisation. Teaching primary and secondary students about playwriting and playmaking is crucial to achieving this goal. These educational programs will cultivate a new generation of First Nations storytellers, ensuring a continuous pipeline of fresh, culturally rich content for the stage.

Objectives

1. Cultivate First Nations Talent:

 By introducing playwriting and playmaking to Primary and Secondary students, we nurture their creative potential and storytelling abilities, laying the foundation for future contributions to S+S Deadly and the performing arts industry more broadly.

2. Preserve and Celebrate Culture:

 Integrating First Nations storytelling traditions into the curriculum helps preserve cultural heritage and instill pride in young First Nations Australians.

3. Foster Community Engagement:

• Engaging students, families, and communities in the creative process builds strong support networks and promotes cultural exchange.

4. Corroboree:

- A series of special events "Corroborees" to showcase and celebrate student work.
- This platform for students to perform their plays will foster a sense of achievement and community involvement.
- Engaging students, families, and communities in the creative process builds strong support networks and promotes cultural exchange.

Program Benefits

1. Educational Enhancement:

 - **New First Nations Theatre Company**: Establish a new First Nations Theatre company based at Turner Theatre on the TAFE Ultimo campus by 2030.
 - **Shorter+Sweeter International:** Develop opportunities to take the very best First Nations work to selected international locations.

New Initiative: Purpose-built LLM for First Nations Storytelling

A groundbreaking addition to the S+S Deadly Program is the development of a purposebuilt Language Learning Model (LLM) by a Sydney-based company that is being designed to assist First Nation children in creating stories and recording existing ones in original languages (where possible and appropriate). This AI tool (My First Story) is envisioned to play a crucial role in preserving and revitalizing First Nations languages by:

- **Creating New Stories:** Helping children generate new stories using their native languages, thus fostering creativity and linguistic skills.
- **Recording Existing Stories:** Working with communities and Elders to digitally archive traditional stories, ensuring they are preserved for future generations.
- Language Preservation: Collecting and maintaining a repository of First Nations languages, supporting efforts to keep these languages alive and vibrant.
- **Long-term Value:** Enhancing the tool's capabilities over time to better support the First Nations community, making it an invaluable resource for cultural preservation.
- Work on this application commenced in June 2024 and is expected to have a pilot 'model' by February 2025.

Overview of the Corroboree Program for First Nations Primary and Secondary Students

Introduction The Corroboree is an innovative and culturally significant program designed to celebrate and showcase the creative talents of First Nations students. This program, which includes both primary and secondary aged students, aims to nurture storytelling, performance skills, and cultural expression through a series of structured events and workshops.

Program Highlights

- 1. Celebration of Creativity and Cultural Expression:
 - The Corroboree program focuses on 5-minute plays, songs, dances, and video projects created by First Nations students, offering them a platform to share their unique stories and cultural heritage.
