## Dear Sir or Madam

As you are aware the transport of live animals during very long sea voyages results in extreme suffering. The practice is cruel: many animals die on route through illness, dehydration and extreme heat. The ships are overcrowded and they are not cleaned – many animals lie in their own excrement. Ships can also sink resulting in the drowning of animals and humans. On top of that I have seen animals being cruelly treated on board ships including being thrown off vessels which results in animals being injured and frightened which only adds to their suffering. If these animals do survive the sea journey they are subjected to an abhorrent death in slaughter houses in the other countries including the middle east that do not meet any standards of ethical animal management.
