### Notes and costing assumptions:

The proposal is to officially recognise a prominent female athlete through the designation of a defined area within Stadium Australia (now known as Accor Stadium).

Venues NSW has advised that all prominent signage areas at Accor Stadium are subject to commercial licencing arrangements and the design of the stadium involves continuous seating rather than individual stands (as is the case at many other sporting grounds such as the Sydney Cricket Ground). Signage at the stadium is via LED displays that are repurposed for each event depending on the type of activity undertaken at the stadium.

The PBO believes that any costs or revenue loss associated with reserving an LED display area for a prominent female athlete would be minor and could be absorbed within the normal budget of Venues NSW.
